Every nook and corner of this, not reserved for passage ways, is occupied by exhibits of the finest variety, and specimens of products that can be gathered from the art gallery, the work-shop, the factory, the press, the kitchen, the garden, the farm, the forest, the earth, the mountain, the stream, and the sea; by all nations of the earth, with their people, manners and customs, to behold and comprehend.

As your time will undoubtedly be limited the best results can be obtained only by keeping a careful record of each day's work, and to this end we publish this memorandum or record book, hoping it may be found useful and convenient to all.

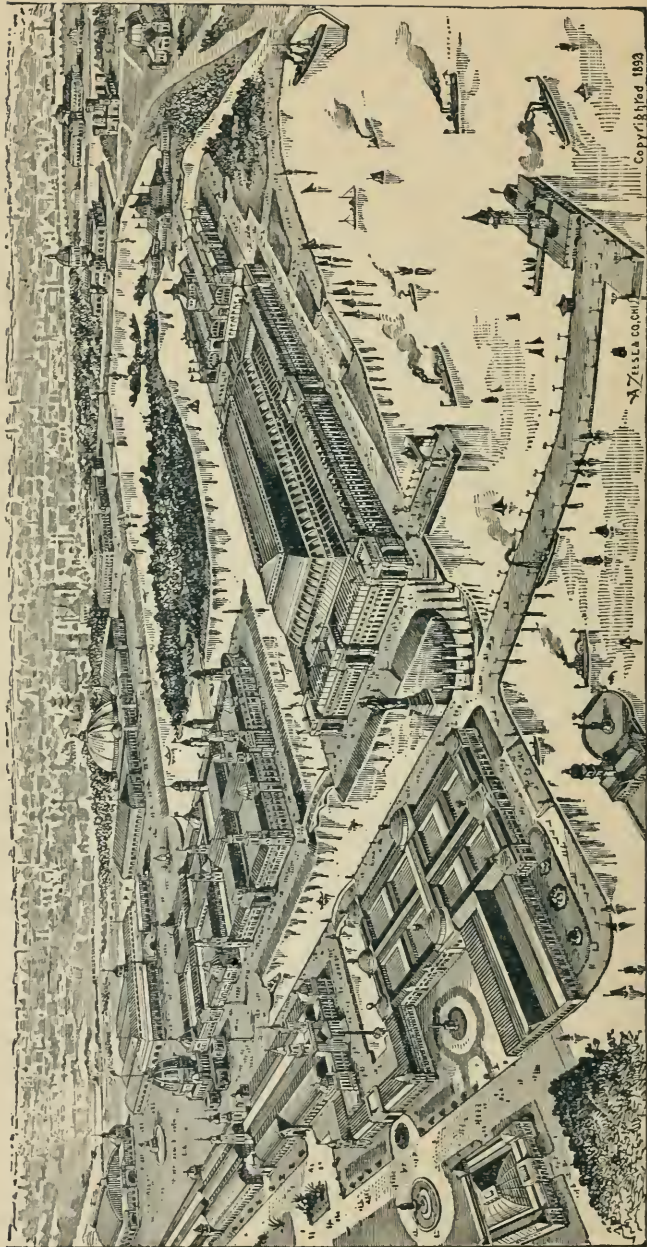

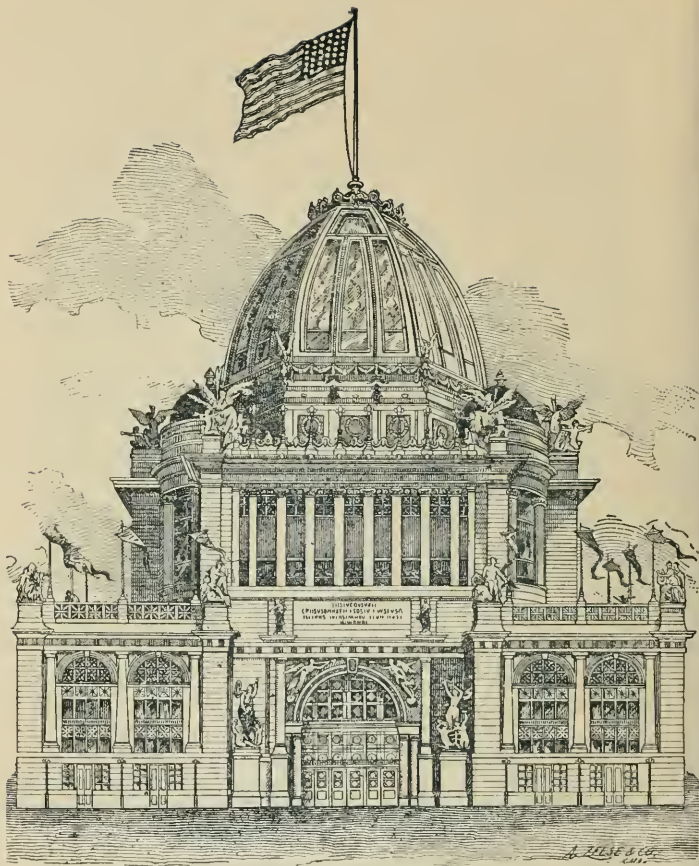
BIRD'S-EYE VIEW OF THE WORLD'S COLUMBIAN EXPOSITION

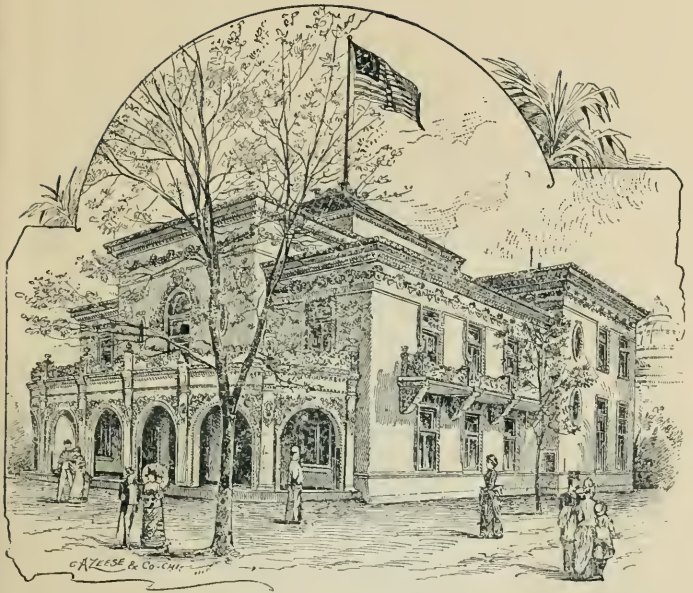
THE ADMINISTRATION BUILDING.

262 x 262 feet square. Being placed as a centre to the principal buildings of the World's Fair, it is the first to admire.

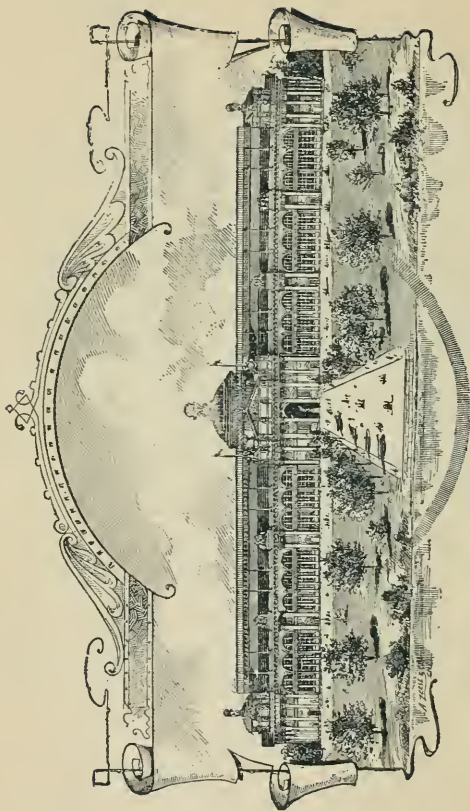

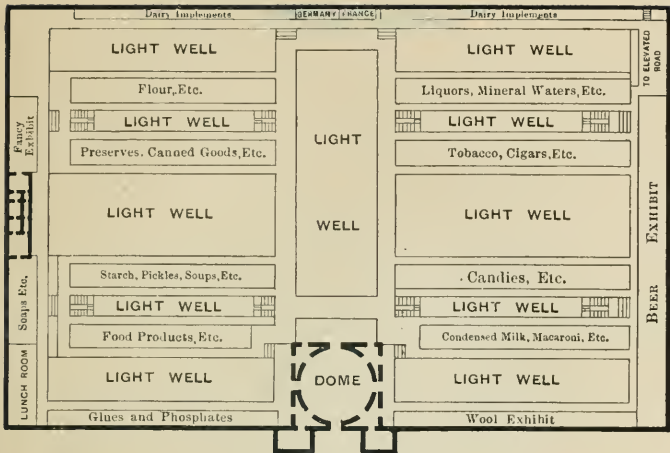

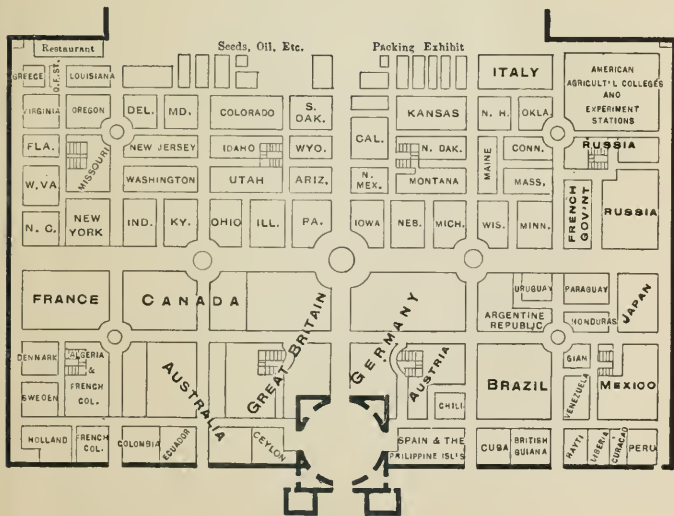

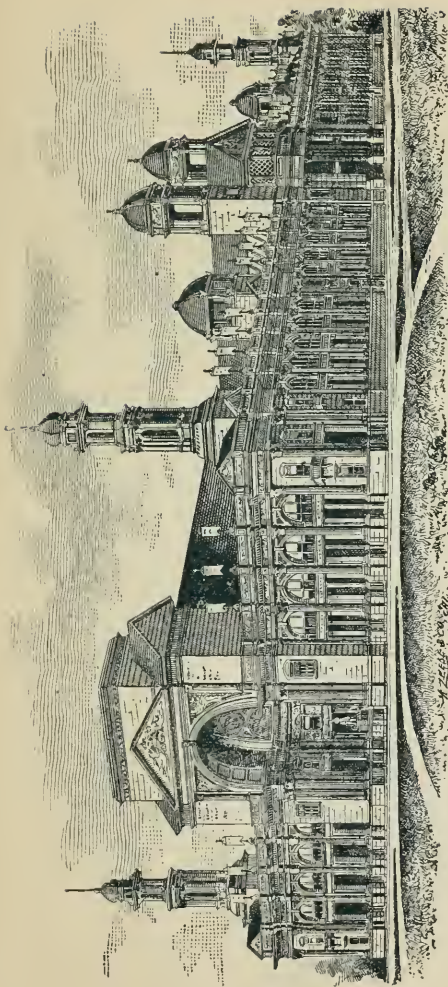

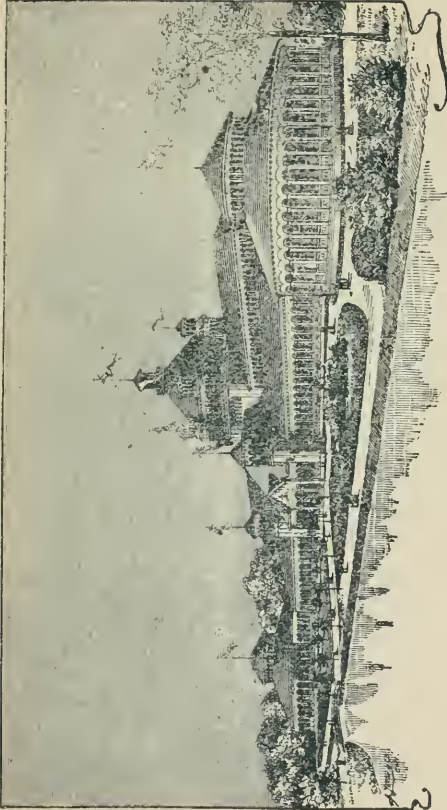

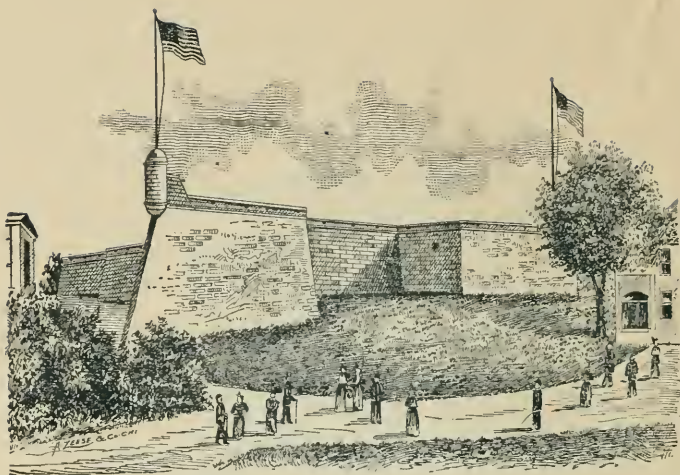

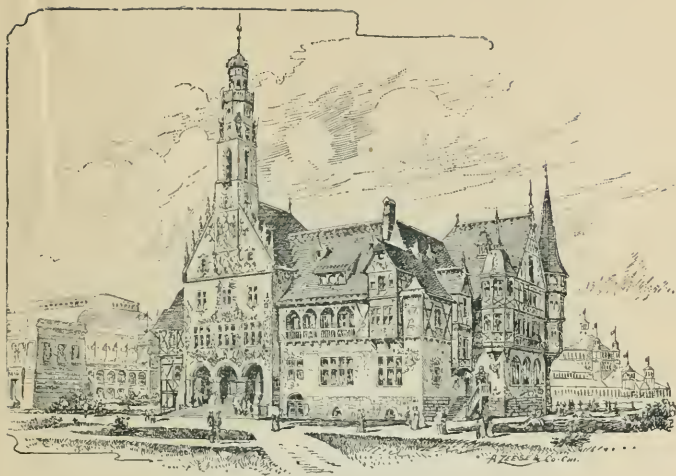

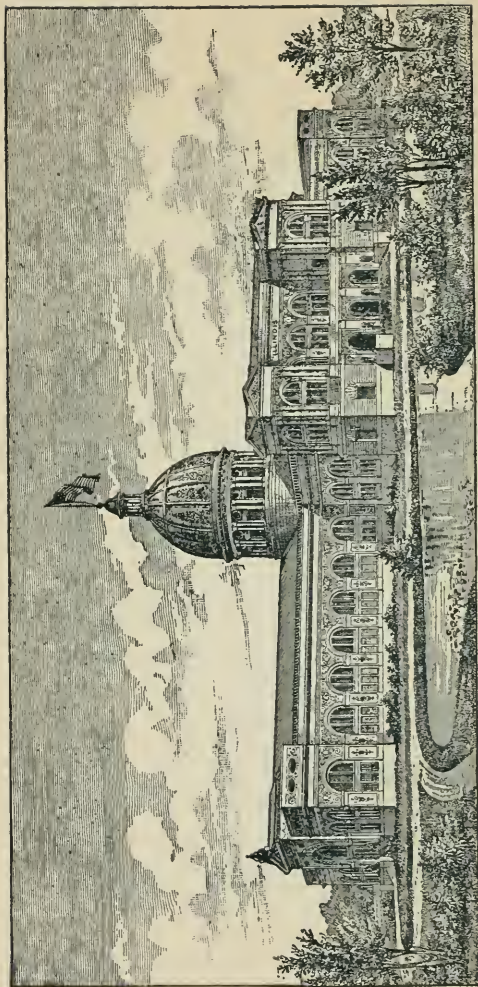

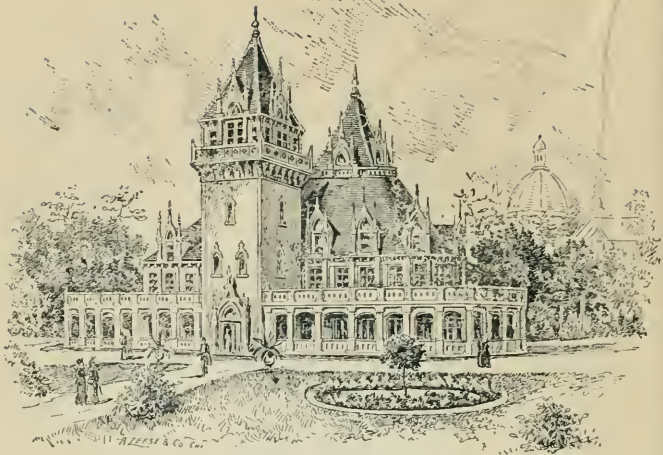
ILLINOIS STATE BUILDING.

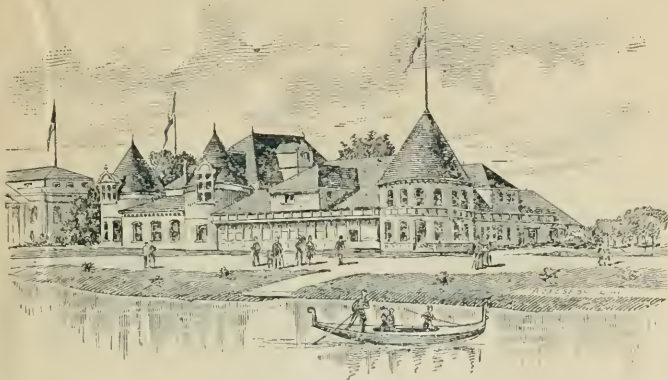

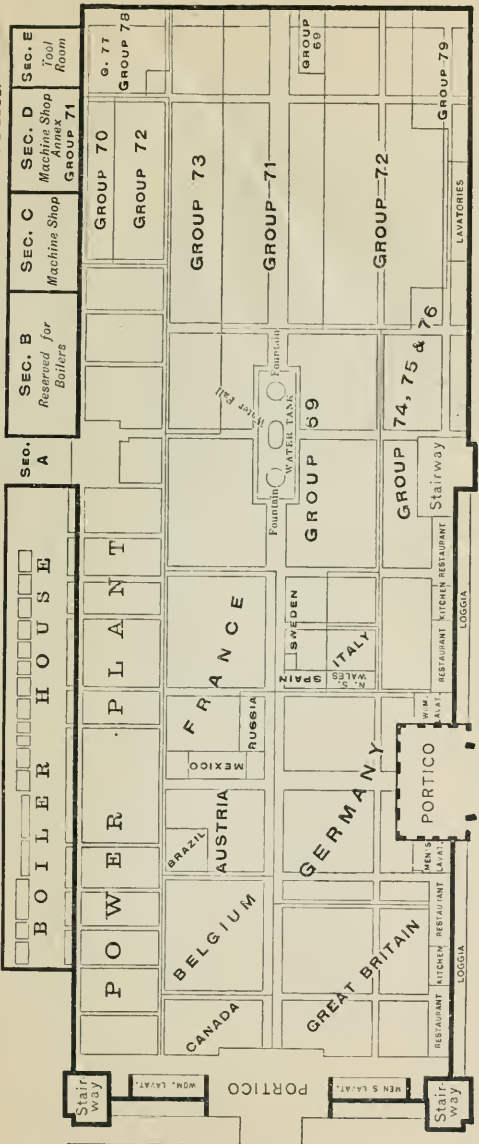

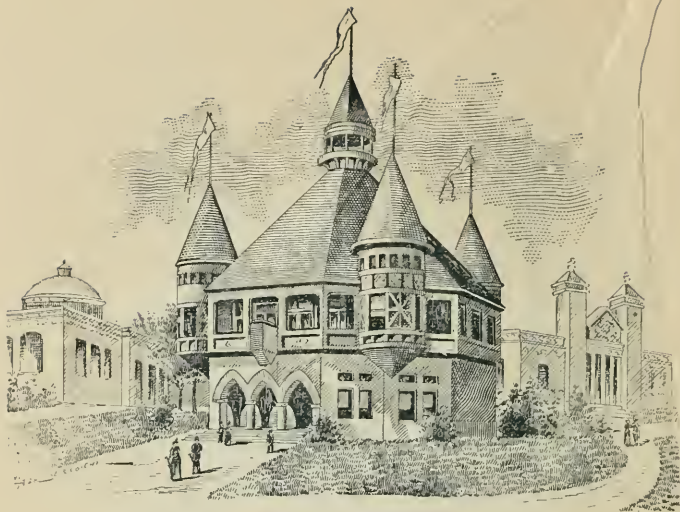

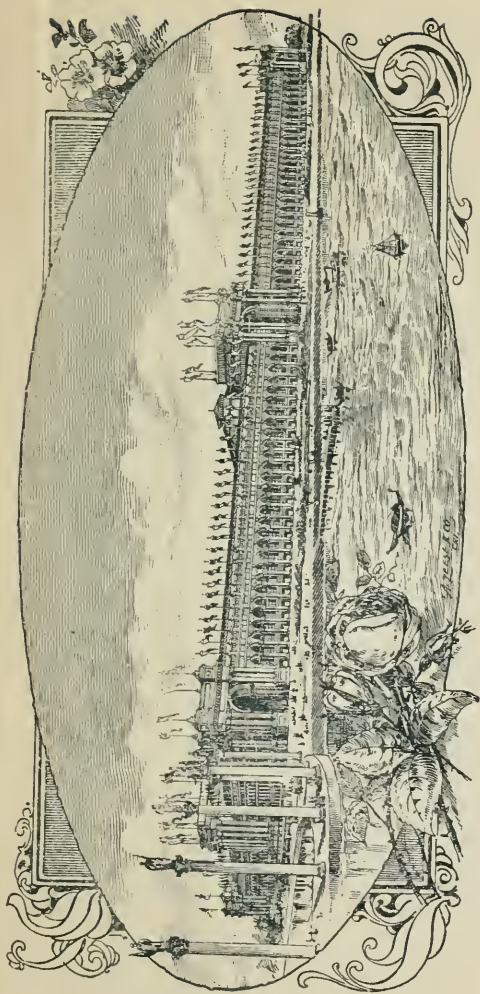


GROUND FLOOR-PLAN MACHINERY HALL.

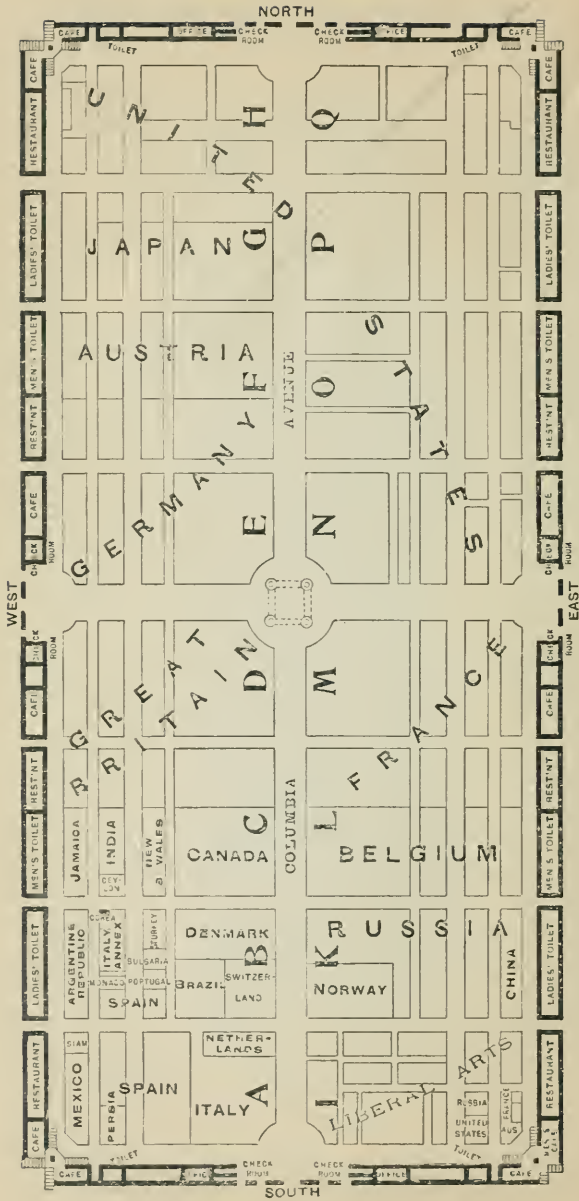

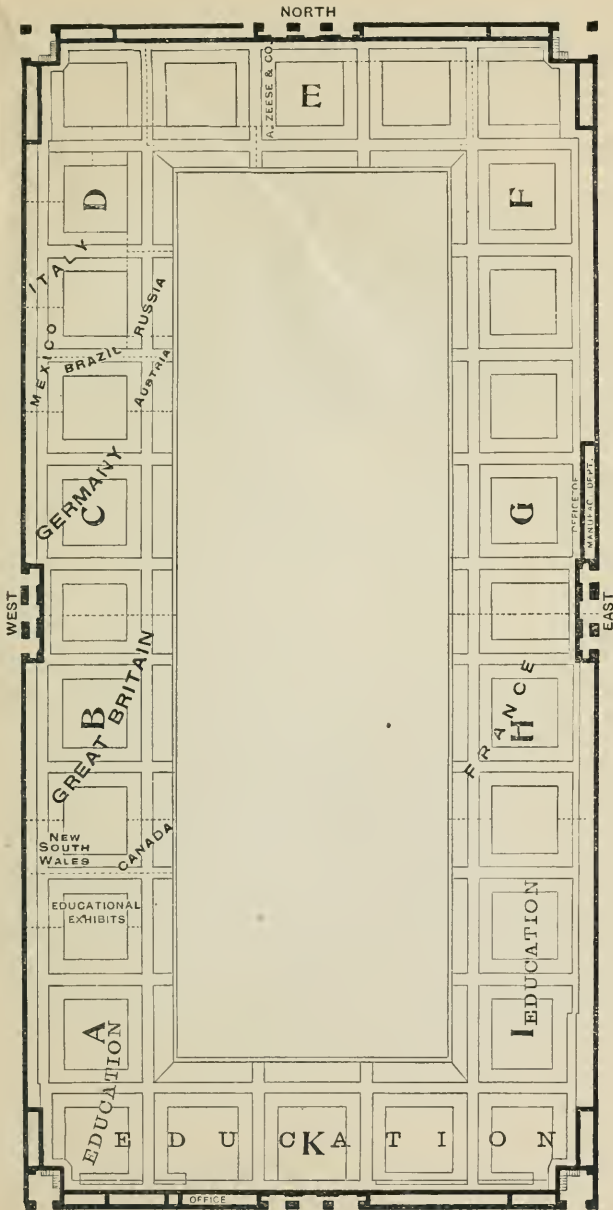

GROUND FLOOR-PLAN OF MANUFACTURES AND LIBERAL ARTS BUILDING.

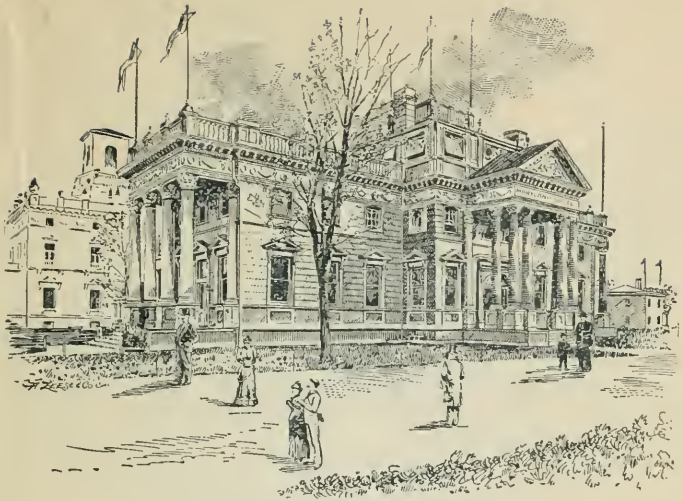


GALLERY FLOOR-PLAN OF MANUFACTURES AND LIBERAL ARTS BUILDING.

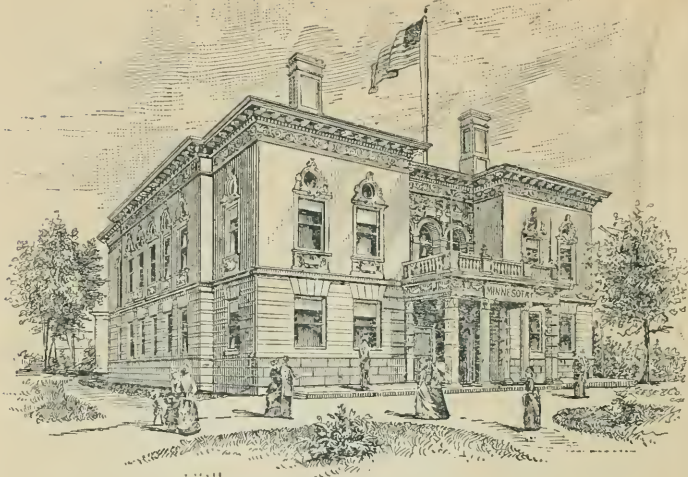

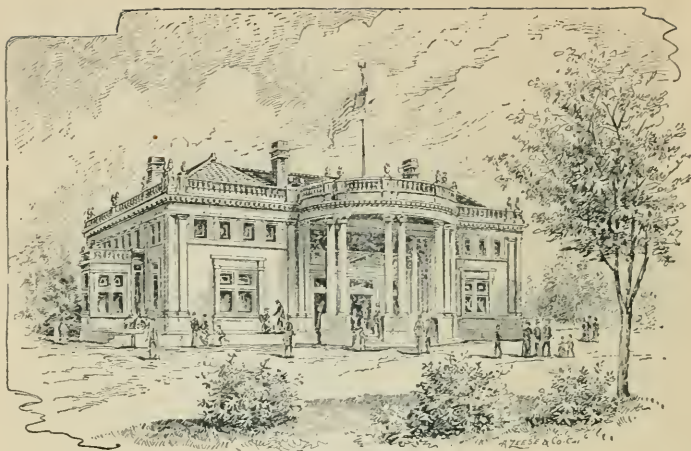

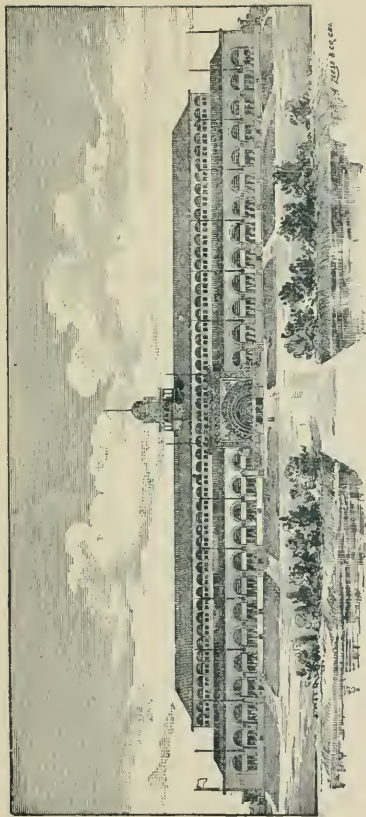

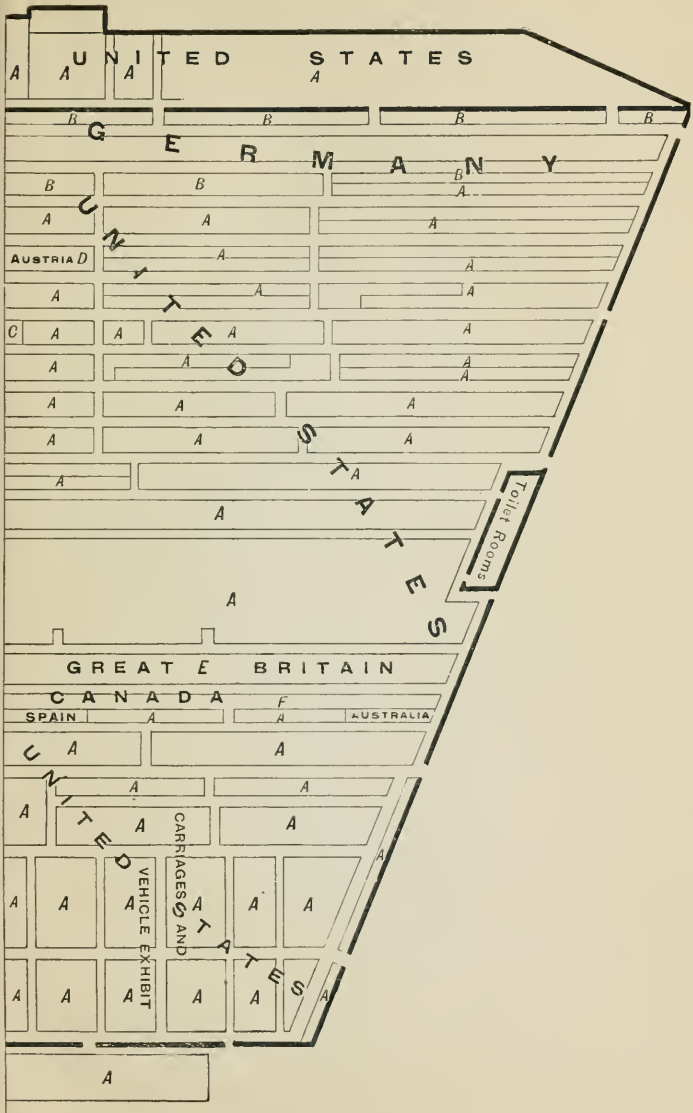


THE TRANSPORTATION BUILDING.

GROUND FLOOR PLAN OF TRANSPORTATION BUILDING AND ANNEX



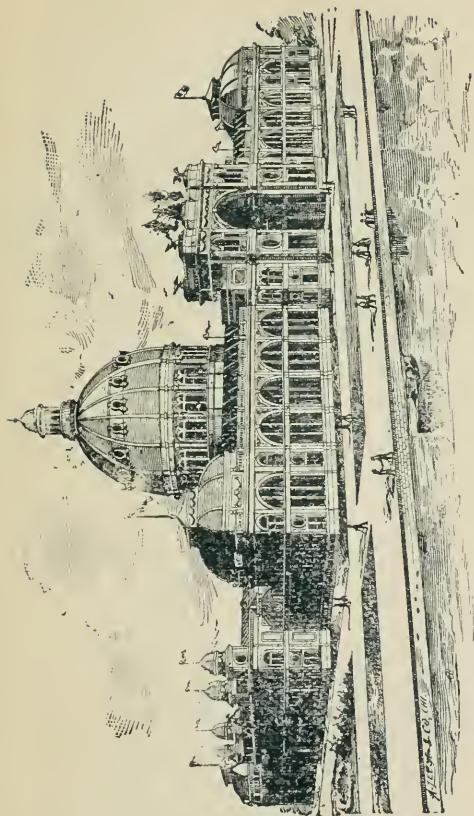

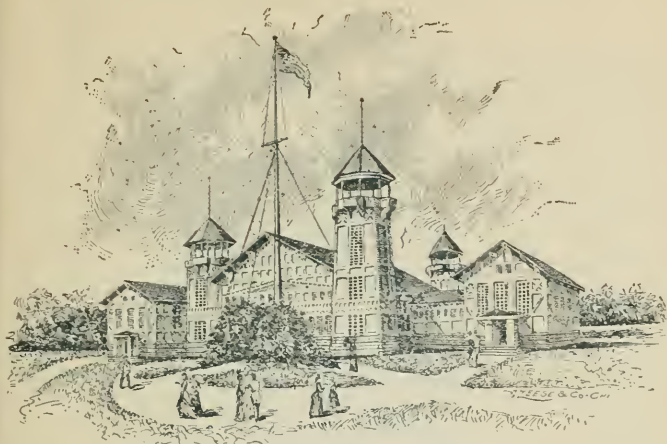

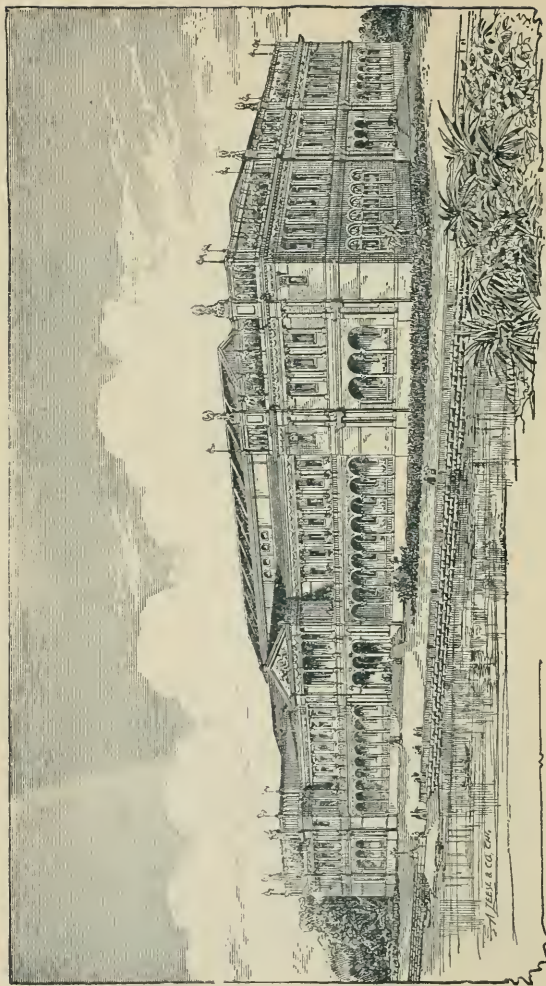
