'Cotton' McNabney, Bloomington restauranteur, who learned the business working as a waiter, seven days a week, 12 hours a day, during the Depression.

Mrs. Jensen, with her late husband, Martin Paulsen, operated Paulsen's Deluxe Motel on Route 66 in the '30's and '40s.

The motel is now operated by Paul and Gretchen Moyemont and is called the Carefree Motel.

We set the date for a Hall of Fame-Tour Meeting March 3 at the Mount Hope Township Hall.

The next general meeting is April 14 at the Chicken Basket Restaurant in Willowbrook.

Leading the Life of Riley



In 1947, at age 42, Bud Riley decided to escape the `rat race of city life' in Rock Falls, Ill., and buy a small business on Route 66 in the Ozarks. Looking for another place, he stopped at a small gas station and cabin near Lebanon, Mo., to ask for directions _ and ended up buying that place instead.

`Our sleeping quarters were in the attic,' he said. `It was hot in the summer and cold in the winter. The toilet was outside. We had no phone. It was nine miles to the nearest grocery store. I couldn't sleep _ I was so excited and happy.''

Ruth, however, wasn't. She had a good job in Rock Falls and decided to stay there for a while with their son, John, 10.



One September morning in 1947, she and Bud bid each other a tearful farewell as she left for work. Bud had a trailer full of second hand equipment

hitched to the family's '37 Oldsmobile and would be leaving for Missouri later that morning.

But when Ruth got home that evening, Bud was still there _ the trailer hitch had broken just as he was pulling away!

`On the way to Lebanon finally, the hitch broke again,' Bud said. `The trailer turned over and my junk spilled all over the highway. My mother was with me. She said, `Buddie, let's go back. This is Friday the 13th and we are not supposed to go.'

`But I said, `Oh, no.' I was able to find a fellow with a truck. I loaded it and he drove my junk to my dream gas station.

`Mother and I got settled. She was no help. She had a wooden leg. I did everything. I washed our clothes by hand. We lived on bologna.''



When school let out the next year, the Rileys's son, John, flew down to Missouri to spend the summer with his father. When he decided to stay there for school the next fall, Ruth came down for a visit. The first day alone was almost too much for her.

`I was sitting in the `store'
_ some canned goods on a
shelf,'' she said. `I was in

(Riley from Page 3) a booth that I thought would fall apart, looking out on Route when I see my husband standing at the highway waving his arms to our son John.



``John was at the wheel of the Olds. He could barely see over the wheel and he had Grandma Riley with him. was giving him the signal that the highway was clear. crossed it and took Grandma for a ride on a bumpy road on the other side. Later Bud built a `road' in back of the station and John would drive on it almost every day.''

Ruth returned to Illinois soon after that. But in six months she was back in the Ozarks for good. They fixed up a house on the hill behind the station.

Using cigarettes as the loss leader and fireworks as a profit maker, they expanded their business.

John started taking flying lessons. A graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, he now flies planes for NASA.

Ruth and Bud sold Riley's Snack Bar in 1965 just at I-44 was pushing them to the wayside. Not long afterwards, the business burned down. Eventually, they settled in Wallops Island, Va.

Bud died in March, 1990, of a heart attack, but Ruth lives on in Wallops Island with John, "thanking the Lord for my good health.'' Their family's saga is truly another classic Route 66. _ Submitted by Tom Teague



Bill introduced

State Representatives Mike Curran and Karen Hasara have introduced House Bill 396, as follows, into the Ill. General Assembly. It would designate U.S. 66 a state historic highway.

``AN ACT in relation to State

historic highways.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 1. This Act may be cited as the U.S. Route 66

Designation Act.

Section 2. The portion of U.S. Route 66 in Illinois that exists on the effective date of this amendatory Act of 1991 is designated as a State historic

highway. Appropriate plaques and signs shall be erected by the Department of Transportation along this route in recognition of the designation.''


YOU CAN HELP! Call and write your state representative and senator. Cite the bill by name (HB 396). Tell them, in your own words, why you'd like to see Route 66 revived. Mention that the signs and plaques will increase Illinois tourism. If their districts include Rt. 66, ask them to sign on as cosponsors.

For progress updates, stay in touch with your state legislators. If there is a hearing for the bill, try to be there.

Minutes from March 3, 1991

The March 3, 1991, meeting opened at 12:12 p.m. at the Mount Hope Township Building in McLean with 28 members present.

This marked the first anniversary of the first Illinois meeting of people interested in forming a Route 66 Association.

Thirteen people, including Nancy Saul, Mary and Chuck Wright, Betty McLellan, Mike Yates, Jeff and Laura Meyer, Bob Waldmeier and Tom Teague, met at the New Log Cabin Restaurant in Pontiac for that first meeting.

The March 3 agenda included House Bill No. 396, which includes tax dollars for erecting signs to mark Rt. 66 in Illinois. Cost would be \$40-\$50 thousand for signs. We should try to get the General Assembly to pass the bill before June 30.

We are afraid the signs will disappear. The Illinois Department of Transportation had 5,000 reproduced signs made. IDOT says they are collectibles and that we won't get the signs up for the Motor Tour as the General Assembly will not pass the bill that early. Members agreed to try to push the legislation through.

The Blues Fest in Chicago will be a different weekend than the Motor Tour this year. Chicago will do everything they did last year. The tour will start at the same place and in the same way.

Friday evening Jim Fryer's Midwest Street Rods business will have an open house from 6 to 10 p.m. The Chicken Basket will have food at the open house. The 66 Cafe and the Countryside Holiday Inn will be the base hotel in the suburbs.

There will be a briefing

meeting Friday evening before the Motor Tour in the suburbs. The Holiday Inn will have a tent set up Saturday morning.

Tom Teague has a two-piece band that will play middle-ofthe-road type music at each of the stops. Cost for the band, including food, transportation and lodging, will be \$600.

The arch will be set up the same place as last year in Chicago. The merchandise table will open between 7 and 7:30 a.m. Goody bags, registration and live band will all be downtown. Howie and Michelle will handle the registration again this year.

Priscilla and Deb are building a registration list. Last year, \$275 was spent on window stickers and \$500 on dash plaques. Last year, 200 consent letters were sent for the tour.

The starting time was 8:30 a.m. and it will be the same this year. There will be no sign hanging event this year.

We should be at Odell between 11:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. John Stonecipher reported that everything is going fine at Odell with committees assigned and another meeting planned for May 13.

Anyone who wants to add a stop to the tour should notify Tom Teague no later than April 1. This includes Steve's Cafe in Chenoa. Tom says he will be the clearing house so he knows what is going on and things people would like to do .

Hall of Fame induction events at McLean should take place between 3:30 and 4 p.m. There will be a local flag ceremony like last year.

Two hours after McLean, we should arrive in Lincoln. A staging area has been suggested. Continued on page 4;





Jim Fryer of Midwest Street Rods will have a kick-off party Friday, June 7, with WJTW Radio from Joliet there.



Metha Jensen, 90, is the Hall of Fame's first female inductee as well as its first foreign born member. She emigrated from Denmark to Dwight in 1921. Soon she married Martin Paulsen. Martin operated a taxi service in Dwight then, later, opened a Phillips 66 station on Rt. 66.

Five or six years after opening the station, Metha and Martin built the Paulsen's Deluxe Motel adjacent to the station. They operated it from 1935 until 1949.

The Paulsens sold the sixunit motel to Mr. and Mrs. John Strufe in 1950. The motel is currently owned by Mr. and Mrs. Paul Moyemont.

The Paulsens originally charged \$1 per person or \$1.50 per couple for rooms.

`We always had a lot of fun on 66,''Mrs. Jensen says. `We enjoyed the business and we enjoyed meeting a lot of nice people.''

Mrs. Jensen recently celebrated her 90th birthday April 20 with a party at the Catholic Parish Hall in Dwight.

Board member Ray Schroeder, who was invited to dance a birthday polka with her, says she is `an unbelievable person, full of vigor.''




Cotton McNabney, his wife and waitresses at one of the restaurants he ran.

Melton E. 'Cotton''
McNabney, 80, first became
associated with Route 66 during
the Depression when he got a job
in Cheona at the Circle Brothers
Cafe _ which was later known as
Wahl Brothers' Cafe and is now
Steve's Cafe. He began working
at the confectionery stand for
\$1 a day and later became a
waiter.

Cotton then worked as a bartender at the Orchard Nook in Pontiac, managed a pool hall in Bloomington and worked at Caterpiller in Peoria before being drafted for World War II. After returning from overseas, he managed Honegger's Motel and Cotton's Cafe in Fairbury four years. From 1949 to 1972, he operated Cotton's Village Inn at 401 N. Main St. in Bloomington.

Discussing his early days at Wahl Brothers, Cotton said, 'They used men waiters, all professionals who had worked in hotels in Chicago and Peoria. They were very good. They could carry four dinners, complete, on their arms, in one trip to the table. The most I could carry was two cups of coffee.''

The Cozy Dog is an original and traditional Route business. Before our association was even formed, its founder and owner, Ed Waldmire, supporting the road's revival with displays at the Cozy Dog. His son, Bob, has drawn many scenes and maps of the highway. And Ed is credited with perfecting a classic form of American roadside fast food _ the corn dog _ on Route 66.

Ed was visiting a brother in Oklahoma in 1941, when he saw the first corn dog being made. `We st opped in a greasy spoon in Muskogee,' Ed said. `They were making it in a contraption like a waffle iron. They poured batter in a trough, put in three wienies and baked it for 15 minutes.''

Toward the end of the war, Ed was stationed with the Army Air Corps in Amarillo, Texas. With a lot of time on his hands, he began thinking about those corn dogs in Muskogee _ and how he could make them faster and

in greater quantities. `Finally, I called a fraternity brother in Galesburg who ran a bakery and asked him to make a batter I could dip a wienie in and deep fry it like a doughnut,' he said.

Cooked in a gas-fueled fryer at the base PX, the corn dogs were an immediate success. Soon Ed was ordering hundreds of pounds of the batter mix at a time. In 1946, he operated a corn dog stand at the Illinois State Fair on Route 66. In 1947, he operated five stands. In 1948, he opened his present restaurant in Springfield.

At first, he called his batter-dipped specialty Crusty Curs. But his wife, Virginia, convinced him a more inviting name would help the product sell better. She suggested Snuggle Puppies, Long Johns and, finally, Cozy Dog. The last one stuck and she drew a logos showing two hot dogs in love.

Only Snortin' Norton on the trucks of Campbell 66 Express and the Fat Man at the Club Cafe in Santa Rose, New Mexico, rank alongside the Cozy Dog couple as classic logs of Route 66.

Ed's son, Buz, runs the Cozy Dog today. Ed still wholesales the mix throughout the country, but Buz may take over that part of the business soon, too. Meanwhile, Ed and his wife, Virginia, are proprietors of Cardinal Hill Crafts, a unique shop built in an old corn crib near Rochester.

They've built their solar-heated home onto the side of the crib. Son Bob lives on the grounds in a converted 1966 school bus. A freelance artist, Bob has specialized in Route 66 scenes and maps for the past several years. He also designed

Dutch association


Dutch fans Hans Stuijfbergen and Harry van Lunteren recently founded the Dutch Route 66 Association, one of the few outside the United States.


They hope fans will meet to exchange stories, admire photos, see films and videos and find other ways to enjoy the highway.

Re: Renaming of Peoria Road

Dear Editor:

It is my feeling that since this route leads to the Lincoln Home area from the north it would serve as a guide to tourists entering our city from the north. Old Rt. 66 would be incorporated into the name as this is what the incorporated into the name as this is what the street was known as prior to the naming it

Peoria Road.

It is my hope that by working with various State and City officials, we will be able to coordinate the name change and improvement of Peoria Road with the improvement of Sangamon

Avenue to Converse Street.

I realize that the official name change effective date would possibly have to be 18 months in the future; therefore I would like to get the process started as soon as possible and will do so by introducing an ordinance for the City Councils consideration in the near

Your ideas and suggestions on this project would be greatly appreciated. It is my feeling that the renaming of Peoria Road to Abe Lincoln Blvd./Old Rt. 66 will be good for tourism in the area. Slots were legal, but beer wasn't

Dorothy Burnet Hampton remembers when porkchops were a nickel and a good home sold for \$400, but distilled water cost more than gasoline. She remembers when farmers installed gas pumps on their land and sold fuel to the traveling public. She remembers when slot machines were legal and beer wasn't. And, she remembers when Route 66 began, because she watched it happen.

`We owned Hendricks Brothers Service in Farmersville from 1926 to 1937,'' Dorothy said, `and we did a little bit of everything _ pump gas, serve food, sell beer. We even had six tourist cabins.

'I remember when 66 came through. They unloaded material off the railroad up in Waggoner and put a spur of pavement into the village. It was 1929 and we were expecting our first child, Charles. It was a hot summer and the detour west of 66 through the country was very muddy and impossible to travel. My husband Cecil's parents lived in Litchfield where the hospital was. His mother told me the first baby usually came early,

so I should come to Litchfield and wait. I went there on July 25. Charles was due August 7. I waited until August 25 to go to the hospital.''

The Hamptons lived in a tworoom apartment above the cafe. There was no air conditioning and Dorothy remembers that the thermometer in the kitchen always stood at degrees _ the highest it could The cafe had tables, but black people were served at the Business boomed in 1932 and 1933 as people drove to the Chicago World's Fair, so the Hamptons started staying open 24 hours a day. Prohibition ended, they started stocking beer due to popular demand. But many of shipments wouldn't because they'd be hijacked along the way. The station had a legal slot machine, but a robber took that one day, too.

Hamptons sold business in 1937 and moved to Waggoner. Dorothy now lives in Springfield. Art McAnarney and Martin Gorman bought the complex and renamed it Art's Cafe. the evening of Nov. 10, 1952, Charles Hampton and his wife were driving to the hospital for the birth of their second child. they passed through Farmersville, they noticed a fire. It was the old family business. Although the time between contractions was growing shorter, they sat awhile anyway and watched as another monument of 66 went up in smoke.

We will need a table for registration Saturday morning and will ask State Farm for a table. A portable megaphone will also be needed to hollar at each other with.

Jeff Meyer and Dan Cuscian will coordinate parking. The volunteered to arrange cars and will be there at 7 a.m. The State Farm crew will arrive at the lobby of the Congress Hotel at 5 p.m. Friday.

Wilmington where Route 66 crossed the bridge. He would like to have it displayed in the Hall of Fame.

At McLean, Chuck Wright Sr. volunteered to be the master of ceremonies. C.J. Beeler said she will get the flat bed, steps for the flat bed, the podium and electricity. Mary Barr, McLean mayor, will get the chairs and bleachers.

They will enter the arch in line and it will be set up the same place it was last year. Tom Teague will check with State Farm and let Glaida Funk known if we have to have people direct traffic. Eric Hince did the signs from Chicago to Lincoln last year. Look for a white sign with a black arrow. Signs from Lincoln to Springfield and from Divernon to Staunton will be put up by Priscilla Mathew and Deb Mileur.

There will be an ice cream truck at Steve's in Chenoa. The Hall of Fame program should last 30 minutes, so stretch out the program. The band will play music on the stage. The two-piece band will make the entire tour. They play middle of the road music.

The MC will introduce association officers. presentee will escort nominee up the stairs. We will have Ernie present the Walmires. All presentees will be there by p.m. and the ceremony will start at 3:30 p.m. already inducted into the Hall of Fame will already be on the stage.

After the Hall of Fame induction, we will gather at the Holiday Inn in Lincoln for the parade to downtown Lincoln, leaving the Holiday Inn at 6:30 p.m. after everyone has checked into their rooms.

At Litchfield, we will congregate at the drive-in theater. The mayor will lead the parade into town. The arch will be block further away from where it was last year. parking will be in a designate parking lot. The ceremony will be at 2 p.m. Priscilla Mathew, president of the Litchfield Chamber of Commerce, will present the Association board members.

There will be a PA by the stage for us to use. The band will play at the arch and on stage. The Litchfield mayor will do something for us. There will be a car show giveaways, a 350 Chevy engine. The mayor will stamp the passports. Everyone is invited to attend a movie at the drivein the Sunday evening of the tour and tour participants are invited to stay at the Gardens in Litchfield. The Gardens will open for breakfast at 7 a.m. morning for participants and the mayor will host the breakfast.

At Granite City, everything is pretty well together. The

Chain of Rocks Bridge has a fence around it. Two 45-seat buses will take people to the lock and dam and give them a historical tour at no charge. Buses will leave every half hour starting at 3:30 or 4 p.m. There will be entertainment at the shopping center. Granite City will be the official end of the tour.

The window sticker will be orange this year. Tom Teague will be in downtown Chicago by noon Friday. The passport and dash plaques will go to the Fairfield Inn and should be there by noon Friday.

Maybe the letters on the sign and outside of the shield should be black, not just an outline, but solid.

Tom Teague will put the plaque in the Hall of Fame. The Hall of Fame committee discussed nominations. Everyone stayed and helped stuff goody bags. A mailing was also put together in envelopes, labeled and sealed to be mailed to all tour participants.


Tom said we obviously had a good meeting without him the last time and could have another



'Guidebook' author dies

A legend of the highway is gone. Jack Rittenhouse, 78, author of ``A Guidebook to Highway 66,'' died of cancer Saturday, Aug. 10, 1991, at his home in Albuquerque.

The guidebook _ a classic _ for which Association members best remember him was but one of his many accomplishments. Colleagues say he was one of the foremost historians of the southwest. A former president of the New Mexico Historical Society, he was named director of the Museum of New Mexico Press in 1967. He had been Southwestern editor, University of New Mexico Press since 1969.

He had been a hobo, mailboy and 42nd Street sideshow barker. He was an ad man and technical writer in California and Texas. His Stagecoach Press, founded in 1951, published more than 50 books.

In the '60s, with his wife, Charlotte, he photographed small towns all over New Mexico with the idea that someone could come back years later and re-photograph them for a `then and now.''

The photos are being preserved by the Rio Grande Historical Collection at New Mexico State University. Memorial contributions may be made to Rittenhouse Historical Photo Project, C/O Rio Grande Historical Collections at NMSU, Box 3006, Las Cruces, N. M. 88003.

Mr. Rittenhouse is survived by Charlotte, his wife of 47 years; sons David of Westmont, Ill., and Douglas of Austin, Texas; and daughters Susan of Plano, Texas, and Ann of Livermore, Calif.

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
