

In future issues, we hope to have a little more history on "Postcards From The Road" Thank you, Jeff for sharing these glimpses of past to present and we look forward to more from you soon.







MISSOURI ROUTE 66 DIAMOND JUBILEE CELEBRATION

Diamonds are rare, and a rare late fall day it was, when the Route 66 Association of Missouri celebrated the 75th Anniversary of their "Mother Road". Veterans Day, November 11, 2001, was drenched with bright sunbeams and a cloudless clear blue umbrella from dawn to dusk. Light breezes caressed the leafless

boughs of the "Route 66 State Park"

Judy and I cruised off 1-44 at exit 266 and immediately it was apparent we were coming to a big party. Traffic was backed up almost to the Interstate. We made a quick stop at the Visitors center and Museum. Buz Waldmire was parked about 3 spaces over and it appeared he was overhauling his VW bus. It took us a quarter of a mile of traffic to reach the parking area.

We started walking and immediately were greeted by Linda Henry, who was assembling a group for the shuttle bus. No common shuttle bus for this assemblage. Up pulled an original 1958 GMC Trail Ways Motor Coach. This unrestored Classic belongs to the American Association of Railroaders, Inc. of St. Louis and is one of the first Motor Coaches equipped with air conditioning and a rear John. What a thrill to board this Classic and ride to the party in style.

At the show ground over 300 classic vehicles sparkled and reflected in the bright noonday sun. Many of the roadies were in "T" shirts, and even a few were seen in short pants. Off the bus and walking through the car show area I remarked to Judy that maybe we should have brought our Pony to the show. We both agreed that it was an unusually warm day, but not quite convertible weather. Before we could go very far we ran into some Shell Oil roadies, who we promptly

invited to make the 2002 Illinois Motor Tour next June. Next we entered the Big Top where Tom Teague and several other authors were autographing their texts. Shellee Graham was touting her "Coral Courts", and smiled as we passed by. The Missouri Association had "T" shirts, Mo. memorabilia and was signing up new members. Lynn Bagdon grabbed me and honored us by having me autograph a Missouri 75th anniversary "T" shirt. I was pleased to be asked.

Across the tent you could buy a Ted Drewes Yogurt for \$3.00. We walked out the other side of the tent and promptly spied Lou Vargo seated at a picnic table enjoying the scenery. Lou explained that he, Lynn and John (Dave) Miller had shared a ride this day. We visited briefly and headed back through the show grounds to admire the Iron. All the while we enjoyed Route 66 Oldies played by the DJ. About two-thirds




1958 Trailways Motor Coach

I talked to John Reed, who was with the "Missouri Route 66 Cruisers" car group and registering vehicles, about the expected size of the turnout. He remarked that they expected about 150 vehicles, and was very pleased to have double that.

We headed back to the Big Top and arrived just in time to watch Linda Henry and her dad, Illinois Route 66 Hall of Famer Wilton Rinkle, giving an interview with a St. Louis TV reporter. We had watched a morning news cast giving info on the day's upcoming celebration. This may have helped bring out the roadies. The park parking lots were filled early and I saw Rich Henry directing the overflow to a new area. Our complements to the Missouri Route 66 Association. They sure know how to throw a Diamond Jubilee Celebration.



CBS VISITS ILLINOIS ROUTE 66

American Airlines and CBS are working together to create a travel documentary of Historic Route 66.

The one-hour film will be shown on all American Airlines flights of two hours or more throughout the month of May 2002. Plans are to also use the gathered material to create a one-hour television program to be broadcast nationwide sometime in May or June of 2002.

CBS producer and writer Ged Young arrived from New York on November 27. For the next three days Mr. Young and his crew filmed people and places along Route 66 in Illinois. Route 66 author and historian John Weiss and his wife Lenore were traveling with him as guides. Their job was to suggest locations and make arrangements for people to be interviewed. John said, "The crew had originally planned to spend 1 1/2 days in Illinois, but they were so impressed, they filmed three full days". The first night was spent in Dwight, instead of their original plan, which was Springfield.

The goal of CBS and American Airlines is to encourage tourists to fly locally and visit American cities. The most well known highway is historic Route 66. Just the mere mention of the famous road brings to mind an image of Norman Rockwell, mom

and pop shops, and apple pie. This is the purpose: To revive the grassroots spirit along with a healthy dose on American nostalgia.

John & Lenore were selected by CBS to help with this project because of their knowledge of Route 66 in Illinois. John has written the highly acclaimed book, "Traveling the New Historic Route 66 in Illinois". This book guides travelers to all the sights along this most famous road. They conduct talks; slide presentations, and bus tours of Route 66. John is also the chairman of the preservation committee of the Route 66 Association of Illinois.

Hundreds of thousands of people will be seeing our area, people and towns for the first time. It is predicted that many will come to visit Route 66 during the coming year. Let's put out the welcome mat and let these travelers know that we are glad to see each and every one of them. Let's encourage tourists to spend time enjoying the hospitality of our shops, restaurants, services, and attractions. We can help them get their kicks on Route 66 in Illinois, where this historic road begins.

A LICENSE TO BUILD

Rich Henry has a project that he is working on and needs your help to make it a success. Back in September, the Illinois Secretary of State began replacing the old passenger car plate design with a new one. What a shame for the old plates to be trashed. He has come up with an idea to build a replica tourist cabin and side it with... you guessed it, old license plates. It will be constructed on the Route 66 side of their property in Staunton. CAMPBELL'S 66 TRACTOR AND TRAILERS PRESERVED IN STAUNTON

Its last day of operation for them was in March 1986. After Campbell's assets were liquidated, a small steel distributor, Tiger Steel Corporation with offices in Springfield, Missouri, and Tulsa, Oklahoma purchased the tractor, still maintaining Missouri plates on it. It appears they ran the tractor till sometime around 1992 or early 1993. At that time it looked as if tractor 539 was doomed for total devastation. It ended up at Truxton Truck Salvage and Parts in Springfield. Missouri on bypass 66 on the north side of town. They would use it to move trailers around in their salvage yard and pull other equipment, sometimes other disabled tractors with a chain to be cut up. Snortin' Norton must of thought he was doomed too, especially when a few parts off of 539 were taken off. In August of 1998, the Henry's saw it sitting there and stopped to take pictures of it. Once the pictures were developed and Rich's brain starting clicking, thinking wouldn't that look nice hooked to their already owned 1975 Snortin' Norton trailer they purchased in April, 1997 from Milan Surplus in Milan, Illinois, thanks to information Jeff LaFollette had given Rich. In September at a going out of business auction for Truxton Salvage, Rich was high bidder and # 539 was rescued. The nice thing, other than the doors being re-lettered during its absence from Campbell, the rest of the tractor maintained all of its original appearance. Even the unit #'s remained on it.


Now # 539 looks as original as ever and gets restless along with Rich for the open road and pulling one of their two Snortin' Norton trailers behind it, or maybe both of them. Here we have preservation, being a



MOTOR TOUR NEWS A MOTOR TOUR FIRST! ENTIRE 2002 MOTOR TOUR TO DRIVE OVER THE CHAIN OF ROCKS BRIDGE!

Your 2002 Motor tour co-Chairmen are Ollie Schwallenstecker & Bill Przybylski. Bill and I have been working with the Motor Tour Committee and others to plan and organize a special event this year. This year's tour will travel from south to north the weekend of June 7 - 9, 2002.

The Chamber of Commerce of Glen Carbon and Edwardsville is again sponsoring a weekend Route 66 Festival at the Edwardsville City Park on the "Mother Road". The Association will have a Friday afternoon registration booth set up starting at approximately 5:00 p.m. We are also working with several organizations to sponsor a St. Louis area media event on the Chain of Rocks Bridge sometime after noon on Friday.

The tour will kick off on Saturday morning with a "Chuck Wagon" breakfast at the museum next to the Phillips 66 Refinery 9 (formerly Shell Oil) at Roxana, Illinois. Phillips 66 Company at the Wood River refinery is supporting the start of this year's motor tour by sponsoring the breakfast and along with Trailnet sponsoring our drive over the Chain of Rocks Bridge.

We will leave the Wood River Refinery History Museum at approximately 8:30 AM and cruise to the Missouri end of the Chain of Rocks Bridge. Time will be allowed to stop on the bridge, sight see, and snap a photo of the scenery. After a mid morning stop at Hamel, the Main Street Association at Staunton will serve lunch. We'll be following the original 1926 alignment between Staunton and Springfield.

Saturday afternoon stops include the Carlinville County Fairgrounds, Nilwood turkey tracks, Virden Sesquicentennial, Auburn square and the Red Brick Road, (this stop may be detoured due to restoration to repair the red brick road to its original condition) and the Springfield Renaissance Hotel for the Motor tour Banquet and Hall of Fame Ceremonies.

Sunday morning starts off at Hall of

Fame member, Bill Shea's service station museum. Intermediate stops before lunch in Chenoa include, the Williamsville train museum, Hall of Fame member Ernie Edwards Pig-Hip Restaurant for snacks, "The Dixie", and the Route 66 Hall of Fame at McLean and Memory Lane in Lexington.

Sunday afternoon intermediate stops begin at the restored Odell Standard Gasoline Station, the two-cell jail and Burt Parkinson's print shop in Gardner, and ending at the Wilmington antique district.

The theme for this year's Motor tour is "Cruisin' the Mother Road". The motor tour dash plaque and windshield decal base color is turquoise and the dash plaque design features the Chain of Rocks Bridge. Route 66 Association of Illinois license plates are again available for \$30.00 per pair.

A separate form must be filled out for each room requested. One form per room not per person.

Do not request a 2-Bed room unless there are two of more people. 2-Bed rooms are a premium.

Hotel room assignments are on a first-come, first serve basis. If hotels/motels of your choice are not available, the Housing Bureau will secure reservations for you at another hotel.

An Acknowledgment from the Housing Bureau will be sent to you upon receiving your housing form. Confirmation will be sent from your hotel/motel. Once a confirmation is received, please make all changes directly with the hotel/motel.

All individuals making reservations with a Car Club are required to return this housing form to the Housing Bureau no later than July 15, 2002, to guarantee reservations at the hotel with your car club.

No rooms will be held with out a credit card. If the hotel/motel does not receive an advance deposit check by August 26, 2002 the credit card will be charged the advance deposit of one night room and tax. All deposits are non-refundable. Any cancellation or arrival and/or departure changes must be made by August 26, 2002 to receive a refund.

TALES ALONG ROUTE 66

STONEY'S SERVICE STATIONS

Hall of Famer, John Stonecipher was a very enterprising young man. Of the many gas and service stations in the town of Odell along Route 66, John owned and operated three of them at different periods of time.

His first was a small station just across the railroad tracks at the north end of town. The second station was purchased in 1949 after he returned from serving in the US Marines during World War II. This station was located in a large framed building that stood where the fire station now stands. This building also housed county vehicles, school busses, and Gussie's Café. In 1955, the entire building was destroyed by fire. The fire was so intense that the authorities dispatched someone to attempt to get a northbound passenger train stopped about a mile south of town. The engineer would not stop, and when the train passed the fire, all the windows on the fireside were blown out and the engineer was injured. The engineer was taken to the hospital when the train stopped in Joliet.

In 1955, John purchased his last gas station, which was located about a half block north of St. Paul's Catholic Church on Route 66. This building still stands. This station stayed in operation until 1989 when John retired. He and his lovely wife, Loyce still reside in Odell, and work very hard in the community as well as with the Route 66 Preservation Committee.

GARDNER JAIL

This two-room jail was built of stone in 1910. The original jail was located in the village hall, behind the existing structure. Gardner was known as a "Good Stop" for the many hobos who traveled the rails. They were usually locked up if they weren't out of town by nightfall. One hobo who didn't like this arrangement set his bedding on fire. Hence, the need for a new jail. The new jail was never used much for anything except local drunks and the housing of hobos who didn't meet the local curfew. Burt Parkinson, a deputy sheriff, amongst other things, tells of housing as many as a dozen at one time in this small jail. Before the inmates were locked up for the night they would visit Burt's newspaper building and collect old newspapers, then they would place them down on the jail floor to be used as bedding and believed that the COOTIES would not travel over the papers. The jail is no longer being used, but is now being restored.

PIG-HIP RESTAURANT

Ernie Edwards of the famed Pig-Hip Restaurant, credits his long success in business from 1937-1991 to recognizing changes when they come and being ready to challenge and meet them.

When Interstate 55 was going in, he knew some changes were going to be needed if he intended to stay in business. He purchased a large neon sign from a Ramada Inn in Bloomington. It simply said "RESTAURANT" in bold red lettering. He placed this sign on top of the roof of his home, which was located in the rear of the restaurant. The sign could be seen from long distances on the interstate. He was, of course fortunate to have been located near an interstate entrance/exit ramp. During the building of the interstate, many of the workers discovered Ernie's famous sandwiches and, no doubt passed on the word. The sign was later removed after Ernie's closing.

PIG-HIP SANDWICH

Where did the Pig-Hip sandwich actually get its name? The name of the sandwich actually originated from a customer who came into the Broadwell Restaurant in its early days. When the customer sat down, Ernie came over to serve him. The customer asked what Ernie had to offer. Ernie gave him a menu, and after a short look, told Ernie, "Just give me a few slices of that pig hip over there." That "pig hip" was actually a fresh ham that Ernie had just baked. Ernie liked the name and began using it on the menu. The rest is history.

ENTERPRISING

Ernie of Pig-Hip fame was always the entrepreneur. He tells the story that as a young man around 1932, he developed a product. The product was sold at local county fairs as well as the Illinois State Fair. He called his product, Chick's French Fried Popcorn. Chick's, the covering was nothing more than yellow dandelion butter mixed with vegetable oil. His gave the popcorn a yellow coloring that was pleasing to the eye. It didn't add any flavor to the product, but it went over big with young people, and Ernie was always one to please the customer.

ROUTE 66 CORRIDOR ACT UPDATE

On Saturday January 12 Annette & I flew out to Albuquerque, New Mexico. Part of the time was for fun but January 16 and 17 was the time for me to get informed and work with a group of 40 people on the future of the Route 66 Corridor Act. To review, the Act authorizes the appropriation of \$10,000,000 over a 10-year period, ending in Fiscal Year (FY) 2009.

Michael Taylor, Program Manager of the Corridor Act conducted the meeting, along with John Conoboy

and David Gaines from the Park Service office in Santa Fe. Historic Preservation officials, transportation officials, Route 66 Association leaders, and various others including David Knudsen of the National Route 66 Federation, Bob Moore from Route 66 Magazine, and Michael Wallis were in attendance.

Many things were discussed during the two-day session. The first day mainly consisted of goals for the meeting which were to agree on criteria and program guidance, discuss technical assistance from the Park Service to help preserve significant resources, explore ways to leverage funding to match federal dollars, and establish a committee to advise the Park Service on forming a permanent committee.

One thing that was first and foremost on everyone's mind was how much money there would be this year. After expenses, there will be only \$150,000 to be allocated for projects in FY 2002. Michael Taylor stressed that we all need to contact our congressional delegations to get more funding secured for 2003 and beyond. The Park Service cannot solicit for the funds...it is up to us to do that, mainly on the association level.

Most of you know that Illinois received \$7,500 for the Odell Station from a \$410,000 share from last year. Most of the money last year went for studies and surveys. But we agreed that it is time to start on projects and get a "success story". Page year the only year to see year.

story". Because the only way to secure more possible government funding in the future is to get some of these "success stories" like the one we have here in Odell.

Besides the meetings, the group took a bus tour along Central Avenue in Albuquerque on Wednesday afternoon. This was the alignment of Route 66 from 1937 until I-40 came along in the 1970's. The group went to the historic Nob Hill District and walked through vintage motels

and also got a tour of the historic Ki-Mo Theatre. Later that evening, the group got together for a social event at the Route 66 Diner on Wednesday evening. A lot of friendships were renewed and a lot of good fellowship followed.

Before the meeting ended we had to elect an ad-hoc committee to advise the National Park Service upon appointing a permanent committee. I was honored to be selected by my peers in the room to serve on this committee, representing the eight associations. A total of five people were elected to serve. I will help with the task of appointing a permanent committee, of which I may have the chance to serve on for a three-year term. I thank them all for their confidence in me.

Now we have a large task on our hands. And the bulk of it falls on you, the Association member. In order for this Corridor Act to succeed, we need the help of all of you. Write your congressman. Tell him or her how you feel about Route 66. Tell him or her that you want to see Congress appropriate more funding for the Route 66 Corridor Act. My task will be trying to get our two senators, Peter Fitzgerald, and Richard Durbin on board. Senator Pete Domenici in New Mexico is a great ally to Route 66. We need that here in Illinois and all along the road. The Park Service is going to ask for \$1,250,000 this year. If they receive it, it will get us back on track for funding over the next seven years. The success of this act begins with the 40 people who met in Albuquerque in

January. It falls upon the shoulders of every Association member from Illinois to California for its ultimate success.

I thank you for taking the time to read this. My goal is to not only have "success stories" here in Illinois but all along Route 66. As we said before we left the meeting. We all are part of a team working together for the common thread that binds us all. That thread is a concrete and asphalt ribbon that stretches 2,448 miles from Lake Michigan to the Pacific shore. Come and be part of our "team".







THE AUBURN BRICK ROAD 13 SAYED FROM DESTRUCTION

I'm about to tell you a wonderful story.

It is about the little road that wouldn't give up.

Our story begins before there was a Route 66. A 1 1/2 mile piece of Portland cement road, 16 feet wide, was then known as Route 4. Then from 1926 to 1930, this little piece of hard road became a link of the new highway called Route 66. This original alignment twisted and turned but folks found it great because all of it was hard (paved) road.

In 1931, the more direct routing was ready and Route 66 moved farther east. Our little road had proudly served its purpose; it now went back to being a country road.

During the depression, in the 1930s, work projects were created to provide income for desperate people. It was an opportunity to earn a much needed pay check. For some unknown reason, that is now lost in time, this section of old Route 66 was scheduled for repaving. This was unique because there were only 3 farm houses on it - one located at each end of the road, and one on the curve. The project was to also widen this little piece of road.

Even though this 1 1/2 mile section had no real importance, it meant work and a pay check. The plan was to cover the original Portland cement pavement with brick. In the process it would also be widened to a width of 20 feet. A sharp curve would also be rerouted with a new, gentler alignment. The two bridges over

Panther Creek that were erected in 1920 were left alone.

Some time after the work was completed, our little horseshoe shaped road became known as Curran Road and Snell Road. Route 4 had been straightened out.

For years the road was lightly used by locals and farmers. The only problem encountered was by farmer's machinery being too wide to pass through the old bridges side rails.

In 1997, IDOT began a paving project on Route 18. It would more effectively carry traffic, especially trucks carrying grain,

from west of Springfield to State Route 4, south of Springfield. The only problem with IDOT's plan is that it included paving half of our historic brick road. Their plan was to tear it up and modernize it. After all, they surmised, it was only an old, useless, piece of brick road. History meant nothing to the designing engineers. They operated with the idea of "The shortest distance between two points is a straight line." Our brick road was in the way.

We, the 3 musketeers, John & Lenore Weiss, and Dorothy Seratt, had to save this treasure. But how? It was like David versus Goliath. What could we do?

The 1.4 miles of hand laid brick was in fantastic condition. The 16 foot wide Portland cement curve was still there along with the two 1920 bridges.

We needed time. How do you stop progress for the sake of history?

On June 4, 1998, IDOT had a preview of their plans. The public as well as we were invited. We were outnumbered 10 to one by what we referred to as "the suits." Their displays were elaborate. Comment sheets were encouraged from locals. Everything looked doomed. We were given copies of all the proposals and comments. It is an impressive stack. 97% of the 115 comment sheets favored IDOT's plans.

In 1998, we applied to have the two bridges declared


historically significant with inclusion onto the Historic Bridge
Survey. We succeeded. Then we prepared the paper work to have the entire road bed included into the National Register of Historic Places. On August 6, 1998, Dorothy Seratt gave the formal presentation to the Historic Sites Advisory Council. They unanimously voted for the inclusion. This was significant, but it does not guarantee protection. But it did create a problem for IDOT.

Our only ally was the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency, headed by Anne Hacker. Because

of the National Register status of the road, they became the official voice.

Lots more talk and paper work followed. The new highway paving project was stopped and put on hold. My stack of paperwork is over 3 inches thick. The formal IDOT folder is titled,

"Documentation of Adverse Effect (Old Route 4)."

One official said to me, "Okay, we will put all this off for 2 or 3 years. By then the road will be in such bad shape, we can proceed due to safety concerns."

Well folks, the little road did not give up. It is still in the same condition today as it was then. Time and trucks could not harm her.

I have recently been informed that IDOT has canceled its plans to extend its original paving project. They are working directly with the IHPA (Illinois Historic Preservation Agency) to completely restore the brick surface. They will not harm the original Portland cement curve. The only change, and it is sensible, is that both bridges will be rebuilt. This is a safety concern. Remember, they are over 80 years old. But, they will be rebuilt in the 1920s style.

The basic message here is, target your projects and act on it. Don't expect someone else to do it. And never give up. In this case, it only took three of us to save our little treasure.

If the number of nominations is a sign, interest in the Hall is at an all-time high. This year there were 26 nominees-double the usual amount. Because of this, six new members were elected instead of the usual four. They are Lou Mitchell's Restaurant in Chicago, John and Lenore Weiss of Wilmington, the Polk-A-Dot Drive In in Braidwood, Gordon Gunderson of Gardner, the Shea Family of Springfield and the Schlechte Family Service Station in Worden. Together they have 325 years of experience on Route 66. Their induction banquet is June 8 at the Renaissance Hotel in Springfield.



LOU MITCHELL'S,

Chicago, Illinois

Nominated by John Miller and Kathy Miller Mitchell's Restaurant began serving customers on Jackson Boulevard in 1923. The business became a family affair in 1929 when owner William Mitchell called in his children to help. Lou, Polly and Demi waited on customers while William managed the kitchen and the books. When Lou took over the restaurant, he changed the name to Lou Mitchell's.

Comfort food may be a trend at other restaurants. At Lou Mitchell's, though, it is a 79-year tradition. Everything is fresh, not frozen. A neon sign out front advertises the "World's Finest Cup of Coffee." Breakfast patrons get complimentary doughnut holes. Lunchers get free Milk Duds. With Lou Mitchell's induction, the Hall of Fame gets its first Chicago member. It's about time.





JOHN AND LENORE WEISS

Wilmington, Illinois

Nominated by Marty Blitstein and Cathy Stevanovich
John and Lenore Weiss are one of Route 66's most
active working couples in Illinois. Although both have
lived on or near 66 for many years, we are recognizing
John and Lenore, first and foremost for their impressive
accomplishments since joining the Route 66 Association
11 years ago. And no two people together are more
deserving of the honor. They give many talks about 66.
They lead tours. John's book "Traveling the New, Historic
Route 66 in Illinois," is the best state guidebook about
the highway.

The Weisses' most enduring contribution to 66, however, will likely be what they've done with preservation. John has been chairman of the Rt. 66 Association's Preservation Committee since 1997. Lenore has been its secretary. They have led the awardwinning restoration of the Standard Station in Odell. They have coordinated the restoration and painting of Meramec Caverns barn signs in Cayuga and Hamel. They are currently leading restoration of the Streetcar diner behind the Riviera Restaurant near Gardner. They've also cleaned bridges and roadways-whatever it takes to get the preservation job done.

POLK-A-DOT DRIVE IN

Braidwood, Illinois Nominated by Marty Bilecki

In 1956, a man named Chet parked a white bus with polka dots painted on it by the side of Route 66 in

Braidwood. He put a kitchen in it, served food from the side windows and Braidwood had its first drive-in restaurant. As time and profit allowed, Chet erected a small building with walk-up windows, then a dining room. Couples John & Cathy Dixon and Dan & Judy Chinski bought the business in 1972, sold it in 1978, and then bought it again in 1987. They have remodeled it extensively with neon and '50s décor from other area businesses. But the walk-up windows are still in use. The restaurant's original Hamilton Beach mixer is on display. Cruise nights are an annual tradition. Green River floats and chili-cheese French fries remain as menu favorites. You can even order a Black Cow. But you have to know the secret because the words "Black Cow" do not appear on the menu.

The Dixons and Chinskis work side by side with their staff. They take pride that many of their young workers have made the honor roll, made valedictorian, and gone on to college. Everyday this team shows that a family-owned and operated business can still thrive in the day of franchises.

THE SHEA FAMILY

Springfield, Illinois Nominated by Mark McBride

This is actually an "amendment" to Bill Shea's original induction in 1993. Bill's own contributions to the character and history of Route 66 are legendary. He landed on D-Day, came home in 1945, and landed in the gas station business on 66. When progress ran his pumps dry, he turned to boat sales, then truck tops. Over the past several years, he's assembled a museum-quality collection of gas station memorabilia. The amendment recognizes that Bill couldn't (and wouldn't) have done all this without his family. Bill's son, also named Bill, has helped out at the family service station for half a century. Still today, if any painting or repair work needs to be done, someone named Shea wields the broom or brush-usually grandchildren Bill Shea III, John Shea or Tiffany Shea Dre. It's a family policy.

When heart surgery slowed the senior Bill three years ago, wife Helen and Bill II and John kept the business on its feet until Bill returned. Two years ago when Bill bought an old steel-sided gas station in Middletown, the whole family helped him tow it 20 miles to Springfield. Then they helped him restore it. Even great-granddaughter Gillian Shea's footprints can be found in the concrete of the "new" station's gas pump island. Thanks to Bill, each and every member of his family is also a sustaining member of the Association. This even includes his newest great-grandchild Jordan (son of Tiffany). If you want to know what family means to Route 66, just drop by Bill's station on a Saturday morning. You may well find four generations there.

SCHLECHTE FAMILY SERVICE STATION AT THE WORDEN Y

Nominated by Marilan Weber, Granddaughter of Fred Schlechte
In 1939, farmer and coal miner Fred Schlechte built a
service station on 66 at the Worden Y. The intersection
got the name "Y" because that's the shape 66 made when
it intersected with local roads there. A year later, Fred's
son Harry built a nightclub next door. Hall of Famer
Russell Soulsby is said to have played clarinet there.
When the Illinois highway department claimed part of
the property in 1954 so it could widen 66, Fred retired.
But not Harry. He just moved both buildings a bit to the
north where the new 66 intersected Illinois 4. With his
wife Dora and children Marilan, Carol, Darla, Lynda,
Harry Jr., Arvel and Richard, he worked there until 1973.

Arvel has run the station for some four decades now. Over the years, he's added wrecker service and tire sales. In 1983, Arvel's son Todd joined him, making the station a four-generation business. A few years ago, Arvel's oil company tried to force him out of the gas pumping business because he wasn't selling enough. But Arvel resisted and today you can still buy gas there.

GORDON GUNDERSON, GARDNER

Nominated by Marilyn and Ted Giovanazzi
Gordon "Gundy" Gunderson is probably one of the
few people still living who helped build a section of the
original road-a railroad overpass near Gardner. He
remembers the actual cement mixture they used and talks
of the horse-drawn equipment.

Later Gundy and a small crew moved an old woodand-steel streetcar from Kankakee to Route 66 in Gardner. There it became a diner. When the diner closed in 1939, Gundy helped move it to a lot on Grundy Street. There it functioned as a summer home, then later as a playhouse. Gundy bought the property and eventually moved the streetcar a third time. Now it stands behind the Riviera Restaurant, which his father-in-law, Jim Girot, originally ran. Today it is being restored by the Association's Preservation Committee.

Gundy owns several buildings and lots along Old 66 in Gardner. They're easy to spot because of all the 66-era relics he has on display. But the real character on display is Gundy himself. Outspoken but friendly, famously thrifty but generous and hospitable, he is a longtime buddy of another Gardner Hall of Famer, Burt Parkinson.





LEAVE PRETTY BABY GIRL AT OIL STATION

Patrolman Volentine found infant, Saturday morning at Sinclair station.

State Highway Patrolman W. C. Volentine on Saturday morning at about 4:30 o'clock found a pretty little baby girl, left in a basket in the driveway at the Sinclair filling station on Route 4 at the corner of West Main and Hibbard streets. Patrolman Volentine was on his way home at the time having been in the vicinity of Litchfield all night checking up on the weight of loads carried by trucks on the highways.

At about 4 o'clock, night patrolman Herbert Herbeck and Walter Stiff passed the station on one of their rounds and did not see the basket containing the child, which was out in plain view, so it is surmised that the basket was left there between 4 and 4:30 o'clock, presumably by persons driving through town on the hard road. The baby, a very pretty little girl five or six weeks old, was neatly dressed in plain but clean clothes. In the basket was a supply of clothing, an empty milk bottle, another receptacle containing food and also an empty milk of magnesia bottle, bearing the label of an Oklahoma City, Okla. drug firm.

The police crew, equal to most any situation, felt just a bit helpless with a sweet little baby girl on their hands and called Mayor Luker for instructions. Mr. Luker suggested that Patrolman Volentine's wife probably would know how to handle the situation and accordingly the infant was taken to the Volentine home, where she was fed and then taken to the Macoupin hospital. Dr. J. R. Liston, county health officer, pronounced the little lady as physically perfect. On Sunday she was taken to the Lutheran orphanage at Peoria while an effort is being made to locate the parents.

From the time the little girl was found in front of the filling station until she was received at the hospital, she was happy and content, never making so much as a whimper. Her big blue eyes were wide open and the poor little waif appeared entirely at peace with the world. How any mother could desert a baby like that is just another one of those things that are not understandable.

Nearly halfway between Carlinville and Nilwood on the original alignment watch for the Turkeys directing you to the Turkey tracks in the concrete. When the road was poured during the early 20's it is surmised that a flock of turkeys, (tame or wild?) must have walked in the soft concrete shortly after it was poured. This section of pavement has never been replaced or repaved. Look for the Turkeys directing you to the north bound lane and this phenomenon.



TALES FROM THE ROAD

More tales from Route 66 as told to our oral historians Ted & Marilyn Giovanazzi and Larry Scinto. This edition's story is about Honest Abe Lincoln's ties to Route 66.

We know of course that "Old Abe" never actually traveled Route 66; however we also know that many

of the trails he did travel as a circuit riding attorney later became state routes and later yet became part of the original Route 66. We realize much substantiated evidence is required before historians will certify any Lincoln tale, but we offer here several stories related to Larry Scinto and me by our Illinois Hall of Famers Burt Parkinson and Ernie Edwards.

When the funeral train of the deceased President Lincoln carried his coffin as well as the coffin of his deceased son from Washington D.C. to Springfield, Illinois it made a stop in each state it passed through. In each state, the honor guard which accompanied the coffin was changed. The officer in charge of the guard detail that took over in Chicago on the Chicago and Alton Railroad was a resident of Gardner, Illinois. His name was Colonel Louis Germaine. The Parkinson family was later to become a neighbor of the Germaines. The home of the colonel is still located at the corner of Monroe and Mazon Streets.

Although the train was not scheduled to make any stops between Chicago and Springfield, the colonel made an exception to stop in Gardner and have its residents pay their last respects. The train arrived at 2:00 a.m. in a driving rain. The entire townsfolk turned out ignoring the weather. A Gardner resident, Mrs. Bull who was a young child at the time related her recollection to Burt of her mother picking her up and holding her high above the deceased President's coffin where she was able to view him. The people of Gardner were always

proud that their town was chosen to be the only stop between destinations.

Years later, a traveling preacher came to Gardner and claimed he was the son of the original caretaker of the cemetery where Lincoln was laid to rest. He told Burt that Lincoln was actually interred three times. The first was a regular grave on the hillside where his monument now stands. The second was a heavy gated vault in the back and bottom of the hill. That site is still marked as the President's grave site until his monument was completed. This vault was kept guarded and secured while construction took place. The preacher claimed the body of Lincoln was actually stolen from the original grave by robbers not long after internment. In those times, grave robbing was not uncommon and often the stolen bodies were displayed at carnivals. The stolen body of the President was quickly recovered, found in a nearby ditch. Eyewitness accounts were told of his face being covered with a green moss and red colored from the copper sulfate used in embalming at that time. It was after this grisly episode that his body was held in the guarded vault until interred under his monument.

Ernie Edwards of "Pig Hip" fame tells us that there is an original water well on his property that the locals have long claimed "Old Abe" and his horse used many times on his circuit travels. That area between Springfield and Lincoln, including Broadwell, Elkhart and Williamsville was a regular trail used by the young Lincoln as an attorney. Stop by sometime and Ernie will be happy to show it to you and entertain you with a yarn or two.



The Newest Route 66 Signage


John Weiss, Chairman of the Illinois Preservation Committee, reports that just because the preservation volunteers completed restoration of the historic barn at Cayuga in 1998, our work was only half done. Next came successful negotiations with IDOT (Illinois Department of Transportation) for a safe turn out for Route 66 travelers. This fabulous parking area and circle turn around was completed in 2001. Next, a campaign by John was to have brown historic signs installed that alerted travelers of this Roadside Attraction. On March 27, 2002, the signs were permanently erected by IDOT.

Is this site complete now? No, says John. At this location, virtually every Route 66 tourist will pass the historic barn site. 99% will probably pull in to see what this is all about.

What we need to do next is develop this high profile location. As it is now, it is a photo opportunity and tourists are able to

safely stroll an abandoned section of original Route 66. John says he will try to have an Illinois Route 66 Association Welcome billboard created along with other amenities such as a picnic table or two. We would be foolish to not take full advantage of what this site offers.

MERAMEC CAVERNS BARN ROUTE 66, CAYUGA

Just north of Pontiac, directly on Route 66, is one of our first completed preservation efforts. This was an extremely difficult project because it was a shingle sided barn. Each shingle was replaced one at a time.

The end result was worth it. Here, too, is where we installed our first Route 66 Roadside Attraction sign.

This project has been so well received that IDOT (Illinois Department of Transportation) has built a paved turn out for tourists to safely pull off the road for sightseeing. It also provides a nice photo opportunity.

Soon historic signs will be installed along Route 66 that will alert travelers to the attraction ahead. The turn out can safely accommodate many cars at once and even tour buses.

Grass seed has been planted and a stone walkway prepared. We will look it over for additional landscaping. Come, revisit this attraction. We are extremely proud of it.

From July 3rd through July 7th, an exciting event will take place in Atlanta, Illinois. That is when the LETTERHEADS come to town.

No, this is not a rock band; it is a group of talented, fun loving artists.

I don't believe a festival like this has ever been held on Route 66 in Illinois.

First, here is the story: The dedicated people of Atlanta are always on the lookout for ways to enhance their town's image. They have completed numerous preservation projects already. Recently on Route 66 they completed a nice downtown park. The main problem was a huge, two story brick wall in very poor visual condition.


Bill Thomas, the motivating force in Atlanta heard of a possible solution. The LETTERHEADS! Upon investigation, he learned that these talented people will come to the aid of a worthy town at no cost to the community. What they will do is use their talents to design, then paint first class wall murals.

Bill Thomas, Lucille Peck and Betty McLellan (Betty is one of the 15 original founders of the Route 66 Association of Illinois) contacted the group and together an agreement was reached.

The first plan is to spruce up the wall in the new park. A design was agreed upon for a 40 foot by 60 foot mural. The wall is in such poor condition that the mural will be painted in pieces on aluminum and then installed on the wall. A second mural is also on the drawing board for a wall across the street.

More than 20 artists will take part in this wonderful art project. Only one more problem still faced the committee from Atlanta. They had to furnish the paints and materials that would be required for the artists. This represents a lot of money.

In early January I was in Atlanta to discuss some unrelated preservation projects. Bill Thomas mentioned the Walldog plan and the problem, paint. Bill nearly fell off his chair when I said I thought I could help. As it turns out, Mr. Dale Johnson was recently on one of my Route 66 bus tours. He works for the Ace Hardware Corporation Paint Department. He volunteered to supply the paints needed for our streetcar restoration. He said, "Let me know if I can help with other Route 66 projects." I contacted Dale Johnson and he immediately got together with Bill Thomas. The end result is, Ace will furnish most of the necessary paints and other items to make this wall mural project a reality.

REBIRTH OF THE EAGLE HOTEL

It opened in 1836. A structure to serve the needs of weary travelers. Food was cooked in the cellar hearth and in a stone oven. The cellar floor was dirt, the walls were limestone.

By today's standards, this would be considered much less than regal. But, back then, it provided a roof over your head and a hot meal.

This is the oldest commercial structure in Will County and probably the oldest on all of Route 66 in Illinois. It is located on Route 66 in Wilmington at the northwest corner of Water Street. This is the old part of town, well known for all the great antique shops.


At the age of 166, this historic building is about to be completely restored.

In its early days, this stone structure served a vital role. It's also reported to have been part of the Underground Railroad. Sitting at the edge of the Kankakee River, it was vital to commerce. And during the days of Route 66 (1926 through 1976) in Illinois, all travelers passed by. Just think of how the world has changed since these walls were constructed.

Its last occupant was the Wilmington Historical Society. But, unfortunately, a fire drove them out. Then for years, it sat deteriorating, waiting for someone to find the funds and desire to bring life back to this piece of history.

Well, it looks like it just may happen. Mr. Bill Scales has purchased the building and has some wonderful plans.

Mr. Scales and his partner, Rob Saunders, from Oregon, took Lenore and me on a tour. His plans were obviously deeply ingrained. Since we are involved in preservation, we could also clearly see his vision.

Others would probably say it cannot be done. We like Bill Scales and Rob, because they are convinced this can be saved. I agree with him.

It will be known as The Historic Eagle Inn & Restaurant. It is already on the National Register of Historic Places. As a result, certain guidelines must be followed. When restored, it will contain 10 cozy, upscale tourist rooms. The main floor will be a dining room with views of Route 66, or the elaborate gardens, overlooking the Old Mill Race waterway, in the rear. The limestone walls will remain exposed. The Inn will have a European flair to it. A chef has already been hired and architectural and structural studies completed. Many hundreds of details are already finished.

Bill Scales said he has looked for many years for just the right preservation project. As soon as he accidentally saw the old Eagle Inn, he knew he had finally found it. His search was over.

We are happy to have Bill on Route 66. He is a hard working classy guy. We wish him well!

Be sure to visit this site during the Route 66 Motor Tour. It ends in Wilmington this year.





As members of the Illinois Association know. Hampton Inn was instrumental in helping with the restoration of the Odell Standard Station. 



Although unveiled on May 21st, as of late August when this newsletter went to press, Heleen Thanas had not gotten governmental permission to post the Roadside Attraction sign on the city street.



Edwardsville's Chamber of Commerce held their Annual "Festival 66" in conjunction with our Motor Tour again this year. Cathy Luttrell and her staff provided entertainment and goodies to roadies on Friday evening. Kathy Miller, Marty Blitstein and Judy Schwallenstecker busied themselves registering this years roadies. Cathy Stevanovich and Jeff and Annette LaFollette were handling Tee shirt sales. Lynn Bagdon and John Miller assisted where needed. Other officers and board members were visiting and enjoying the beautiful weather. Mother Nature on Friday provided the first of what proved to be a weekend of near perfect cruising weather. No liquid sunshine would darken the blue skies of this year's tour. Area motels reported that they were booked full on Friday evening. The anticipation of something special was everywhere.

Early Saturday morning dawned with clear blue skies and a light breeze. Phillips 66 Petroleum's" Wood River Refinery had one crew handling parking and another serving a free Chuck Wagon breakfast. 


Tour roadies placed quite a test on the old structure as the motorized magic carpets gave the appearance of an over one mile long train crossing the mighty muddy Mississippi River.


A few miles (about 5) further on virgin pavement everyone was astounded to observe Nilwood's World Famous Turkey tracks. Will wonders ever cease?

Virden is celebrating their 150th anniversary this year. This year's Motor Tour helped with the celebration. John Alexander, Wayne Joplin, Russ Boehl and others of Virden set up an afternoon of celebrating the 75-year span in time from the Civil War to Route 66. Meet david & Mary Lou Knudsen Of the National Route 66 federation

Since the International Route 66 Festival in Springfield, Illinois is going on this year, I thought it would be appropriate to introduce to you David & Mary Lou Knudsen of the National Route 66 Federation. They will conduct the John Steinbeck Award Ceremony on Friday September 27. This is the first in an eight part series about our sister associations and the National Federation.

- 1) When was the National Route 66 Federation founded? 1994
- 2) How many members does the Federation have currently? Depending on renewals each month and new members, approximately 2,100. All told, we grow by around 100 members each quarter.
- 3) What is the purpose of the National Route 66 Federation?

 In April of 1994, Mary Lou and I had a chance to drive from Chicago to LA. We had hoped to recapture some of memories of the route. Mine, when I drove out here to LA from Detroit to get a job in 1961, and Mary Lou's when she and her family drove back and forth during WWII. Her dad was in the Air Force.

Well, we couldn't find 66 on our maps so we stopped at Dixie Trucker's Home and they had a set of Jim Ross' maps. Our planned 3-4 day trip turned into nearly a month. We were immediately dismayed how much of the old road, and businesses along it had disappeared. It had been all but forgotten. We knew something had to be done to try to save it. So, when we got home, I sold the shares in my business and we went to work trying to do just that.

We immediately became embroiled in all kinds of preservation battles up and down the road, and I must admit, ruffled some feathers on account of it. But, we have become less and less involved in individual preservation projects, lately. We simply ran out of time. We are trying to take the role of

supporting state associations in these local problems, now.

We see our major role now as working at the global level, publicizing the route, working with cities to bring people in for their international festivals, responding to hundreds of e-mails with questions about the road, encouraging people to explore it and working with the Federal government in a growing capacity. But always for the purpose of saving the Mother Road for today's and future generations.

4) We are honored that you have decided to hold the John Steinbeck Award Ceremony in Illinois for the first time. Was it the newly created International Route 66 Festival that made you decide to hold the event here or was there something else that attracted you to Springfield?

In Albuquerque, the city built their 3 day festival, last year, around the Steinbeck Award Evening. We were invited there two years before it took place to help them put it together because they knew that the evening would bring in people from all over and it would add an air of prestige to the their event. Depending on who you talk to at their CVB, they estimate anywhere between 80,000-100,00 people came to town for the festivities. The evening sold out a month in advance with very little local publicity. This translates into major business. To use a tourism industry phrase, it means "heads in beds".

Several months before the Albuquerque event

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"The Addict" and the "Widow"

THE MOTHER ROAD WIDOW

A humorous autobiographical exaggeration of life with a roadie! By Kathleen J. Miller, the wife of a Route 66 ADDICT!

Let me begin by explaining a little bit about what "The Mother Road" means to me. I know the basic history of "The Mother Road" also known as the famous Historical Route 66.

I know it runs from Chicago to L.A., etc. etc. The real meaning to me is this, unless I use the words Route 66 in any given conversation with my husband, no matter what it is about, he does not hear me. For instance, to get his attention in and emergency I must say something like "Honey, while driving on Route 66 today, your brother severed his limb, we need to go to the emergency room to be with him!" He'd say, "Oh my goodness, let's get going, what are you waiting for!" If I had said, "Honey, your brother is seriously hurt, his limb is severed, we need to go now!" he would have shrugged and nodded, and then I would have to scream, "Honey!" Because without the words Route 66 in a conversation, he would not have heard me at all!

With that in mind, here is my story of how I became "The Mother Road Widow"

It was June 1996 when DH (dear husband or damned husband depending on the day) turned and said to me, "Honey, let's go for a ride. I read in the newspaper about some kind of motor tour on Route 66 and the celebration will be in Lincoln, Illinois. It will be so cool! They drive through an arch and everything!" Mistake #1 Being a sucker for togetherness I responded, 'Sure sounds fun!" It was that easy for my life as "The Mother Road Widow" to begin.

We phoned my sister and her beloved hubby to invite them along on our little jaunt. We live five miles south of Chicago. To give you an idea of how far my DH is willing to drive for "The Mother Road" the town of Lincoln, Illinois is approximately 155 miles even still further south of us, so it is approximately 160 miles south of Chicago. We traveled along I-55 (not yet being familiar with the Old Route 66 we chose to take the most direct road which was the interstate.) While traveling along I-55, we would see small caravans of cars driving along the road that ran

next to us, Route 66. Every once in a while, we would notice a stray lone car scattered here and there. We assumed they were with the motor tour. We reckoned they must have lost the group and were driving solo. We later found out this was not the case. It seems the people participating on the motor tour get very side tracked. They stop at every possible place there is to see along the route. They stop to see what it is, what it was, and make plans for what it could become. This is what people with the "Mother Road" addiction do. If only I had known then how contagious this addiction is.

We arrived in Lincoln, Illinois before the motor tour participants. The celebration was already taking place on the streets that surround the courthouse, which forms a traditional town square. This is small town America at its best. Vendors were set up selling food, mostly pork. Pork is very popular in central Illinois. You can buy pork burgers, pork chop sandwiches, sliced pork, barbequed pork, pineapple pork, and along with all that pork they had beverages. No alcohol was sold, not even a cold beer was to be found, and I also noticed there was no pubs or local bars. Things up north are very different. Where I live there is one bar for every 10 adults. This town had several antique stores. I always wondered why you do not find antique stores up north. There must be old things up north, or maybe it's like everything else, you go south when you retire.

Within an hour, a pick-up truck arrived with an arch in the back bed. The arch was silver and sparkly and in the center of it was a sign that read "Historic Route 66". I should have known immediately to grab my DH and flee. The look in his eyes was that of an addict when they first sample whatever addiction they imbibe in. DH's eyes became transfixed upon that arch, they turned

took place, John Weiss said Springfield was interested in talking with us about coming to their city. We got on a plane, flew out and had an extremely productive meeting with them. Then, they sent some people to the Albuquerque event, looked it over and confirmed their idea to do it there.

The moment we met the Springfield folks, we knew they were very bright, dedicated people. It is an ideal location. I call Springfield the quintessential Hometown America. I am not sure whether they would have had a festival if we had not decided to get involved.

5) When & where did the idea of the John Steinbeck and Cyrus Avery Awards originate?

The idea for the John Steinbeck Award originated almost immediately after we founded the Federation. It just seemed to be essential for a preservation organization to recognize those who had contributed to the route's preservation.

But we also knew that to get serious attention paid to Route 66 and to the award, we would have to hold a major event somewhere. We chose Oklahoma City. We called the event, "The Nationwide Route 66 Celebration" and invited all the notables - Michael Wallis, Marian Clark, Bobby Troup, Martin Milner, etc. We had a wonderful program planned with the first award presentation, authentic dancers from the Cherokee Nation and a lot of other things. But it was only one evening. Then 3 weeks before it was to take place, Oklahoma City's Murrah Building was bombed. Well, we just couldn't follow that with a celebration so we cancelled it.

The cancellation actually picked up enough news coverage to get seen by the John Steinbeck Foundation. They contacted us and asked to be part of the award, as well as requesting that we change the award name to the "John Steinbeck" rather than just the 'Steinbeck' Award. They play an integral part in the decision to select the honoree.

The Cyrus Avery Award originated as preservation projects were undertaken. Both awards are recognition for a preservation job well done and will likely be the only two we will present. With the Avery, many people have a chance to be part of winning it. Our hope is that the Avery will help encourage more projects like the Odell Station. Based on the nominations this year, it has done just that.

6) David, you were one of the main proponents of the Route 66 Corridor Act of 1999, authorizing the federal government to allocate \$10,000,000 to Route 66 projects over a ten year period. What is your assessment of the act to date?

It is fair to say that the Federation helped create and spearhead the act but many others really went to work to get it passed. It was an exhausting, gruesome job.

It has had its high and low points. Mike Taylor is as good as it gets when it comes to directing the Corridor Act Preservation Program. But, we weren't aware after it passed that it wasn't THE LAW. It requires badgering politicians every year to get them to vote to allocate dollars for it. So, although, as you said, \$10 million was appropriated over a period of 10 years, that does not mean we will get it. Sad but true. We could get a portion of our appropriated \$1 million each year or none at all. So, we have to badger the politicians every year. In fact, a lot of our grass roots support has, naturally waned, out of frustration. We just hope we can keep it afloat because we have quite a few very deserving properties. Lately, we're starting to turn our attention to corporate America.

- 7) Do you see the Route 66 Corridor Act being renewed after the year 2009, when the program sunsets?

 If it is alive and well then, its administration is supposed to be turned over to a private organization.
- 8) Are you satisfied with preservation efforts along Route 66 as a whole?

Not at all. It might just be the nature of a preservationist not to be satisfied but the problems are major.

When we formed the Federation, we were shocked to receive letters from people outraged at what we were trying to do. They called us all sorts of names, they thrashed us for trying to involve the government, a major magazine printed a searing editorial telling us to keep our hands off the roadit does not need preserving. Most of this has subsided but not all of it. This line of thinking has its followers and it has made sincere preservation efforts needlessly difficult.

There are still landmarks being torn down and roadbed being torn up. A good part of preservation is education, and I wish we could do a better job of educating everyone to the fact that Route 66 is an important part of our heritage. And, once a stretch

however, he decided to achieve "an ambition, a dream" to build his own theatre — a theatre that would surpass the Greek temple/Chinese pavilion examples of contemporary movie mania.

Bachechi's vision for a unique Southwestern theatre was commissioned to designer Carl Boller of the Los Angeles Boller Brothers architectural firm. The Bollers had designed the wild-west-rococo style theatre in San Antonio, Texas and a Spanish cathedral cum Greco-Babylonian interior in St. Joseph, Missouri. Carl Boller traveled extensively throughout the Southwest, visiting the pueblos of Acoma and Isleta, and the Navajo nation. After months of research. he submitted a watercolor rendering of the theatre's interior that pleased Oreste Bachechi. The interior included plaster ceiling beams textured to look like logs painted with Indian symbols, air vents camouflaged as Navajo rugs, panoramic murals depicting the Seven Cities of Cibolo, chandeliers shaped like war drums and funerary canoes, wrought iron birds descending the stairs, and square column capitols adorned with bearded (rope garland) steer skulls with eerie, glowing amber eyes.

This is a history about the KiMo Theatre in downtown Albuquerque, New Mexico. The KiMo is located at 423 Central Avenue NW, which is located on the 1937 alignment of Route 66 through the city.

The KiMo Theatre opened as a motion picture/vaudeville palace on September 19, 1927, one year after Route 66 was born, but 10 vears before Central Avenue became the alignment of Route 66 through the city. 1927 was the year of the first talkie "The Jazz Singer" starring Al Jolson. Picture palaces were all the rage and any town that was any town boasted one of these architectural marvels. The KiMo's particular style came to be known as pueblo deco, a fusion of popular art deco elements and Indian motifs of the Southwest. At a time when movie palaces were being constructed with exotic themes, the KiMo was from its name "king of its kind".

Oreste Bachechi came to the United States in 1885 and established a bar in a tent located near the railroad tracks in Albuquerque. As his fortunes expanded along with the city's growth he became a liquor dealer and proprietor of grocery store while his wife Maria operated a dry goods store in the Elms Hotel. Bachechi's involvement with movies happened around 1919 when his Bachechi Amusement Association operated the Pastime theatre with partner Joe Barnett. By 1925

cal significance — rain clouds, birds, even the Navajo swastikas which are symbols for life, freedom, and the happiness and loosely interpreted as the four winds or the four elements, earth, wind, fire, and water. Choosing colors was equally time consuming. The Indian vocabularies meant red as the life giving sun, white the approaching morning, yellow the West's setting sun, and black the forbidding clouds in the north sky. Superlative compliments to the various motifs throughout the theatre are the seven mezzanine murals painted by Carl Von Hassler, who spent months on platforms and scaffolding painstakingly executing his vision of the "Seven Cities of Cibola"" cities of gold and wealth that the Spanish conquistadors believed existed in New Mexico. In reality, the murals depict various Indian pueblos within and around the state. Unfortunately, one mural was lost in the numerous years the theatre has undergone changes and renovations. An artist's small rendering of what it may have looked like hangs on the barren wall.

Each chosen design has a histori-

The balcony which spans the entire east-west width of the

of it or a vintage motel or diner along it is gone, it's gone forever. You can't clone it in a theme park. It is heartbreaking for us to see this continue.

9) What do you see as the biggest challenge, or the project that desperately needs to be saved, along the Route 66 Corridor today?

One of the first projects we took on was Arizona's Crozier Canyon and we are still closely involved with it. Recently, we were able to get the Hualapi tribe involved. This is arguably, the most scenic stretch of the route. This canyon was captured in paintings used by the Santa Fe in their ads in the early 20's to bring people west

on their trains. They felt the canyon best depicted the beauty of the west.

Much of the land is owned privately and is now being stripped of its rocks leaving just ugly dirt. The owners sell the rocks for ornamental use primarily in Las Vegas and Phoenix. It is becoming an awful sight. But Arizona citizens, including its politicians, believe a man can do what he wants with his land. The newspaper in nearby Kingman has a hands-off policy. So the day will come that this beautiful canyon will be a huge eyesore. This could never be done in California because we have learned from our forefathers.

Another is the McCook gravel pit problem. An absolute disgrace. We are still working on that, too. In fact, McCook's Mayor Gorski is scheduled to say a few words about it at the John Steinbeck Award Evening.

glassy and I swear I saw drool streaming from his smiling lips. He was so awestruck I think a Vegas girlie show could have taken place in front of him and he would not have noticed. I watched him in amazement. Then, "Oh My Goodness!" the parade of cars started. One by one they passed under that arch. People were waving and clapping as they drove slowly around the town square. A parade of cars, antiques, classics, sports cars, family sedans, even mini-vans passed by for viewing. There was no special requirement to be in the parade. Just the love of the "Mother Road" was enough. I knew in an instant by the look on my DH's face this too was my future!

Returning home, for nearly three weeks, no more was said about that day. Little did I know my wonderful, funny, loving, caring, handsome, computer illiterate, DH had been on the Internet consuming everything he could detect on Route 66. After we went to sleep for the night, or at least I thought it was "we", he would rise from his sleep much like a zombie from a grave and make his way to the computer. He would log on half in a daze and search the World Wide Web for any and all information he could find on the subject of Route 66. Alas, he found "The page." The website for the Route 66 Association of Illinois. I will never forget this day. This is also the day I found out he was not the computer illiterate that I thought he was. I found out not only did he make his way surfing the World Wide Web, he also learned about printers, which is another subject altogether. He thinks printing out everything he downloads is fun! This is the same man who nearly has a seizure because we turn on the air conditioner when it's

merely in the 90's outside. DH now finds that replacing an ink cartridge at the cost of \$6,000,000.00 a pop isn't expensive at all. Oh all right I exaggerated, but you get my point!

His obsession continued into the fall of the year. As he browsed the Route 66 Association of Illinois website he found an application for membership. Bob Close started operating the Odell service station in 1952. When he took it over it was a Sinclair Oil Station, and it remained Sinclair until he stopped selling gasoline in 1967. The pumps back then in the 1950's were mostly white on the side with the logo on the front and back. This station was very much a part of Route 66, located on the original route that went through the heart of Odell, but with the advent of the

four lane bypass in 1946, did not do as much business as it had once had. A good part of the customers were local people who came out to fill up change the oil, fix a tire, or maybe get a little work done on the car. A lot of the husbands would sit around and visit while the wives were shopping and visiting in town. The station was a community gathering place, that part of Americana that we have lost over the years.

There would be times when Bob would have to leave the station unattended to go to town to get lunch, run to the bank or some other chore. If a local customer pulled in while he was gone, no problem. Just get out of the car and help yourself. Bob probably was one of the first people with self-service and didn't even know it. So you wonder how these people would pay for their gas if Bob wasn't there. Simple! They would just jot down their name and how many gallons they drew on the side of the gas pump with a pen left out there for that purpose. Later in the week when they had the time, they would stop in and pay Bob what they owed him, and he would wipe their name off the pump. This was a friendly and accurate way of keeping track of business and there was never a problem with it. Bob didn't believe that he had ever not been paid

One day while Bob was uptown having lunch, a representative from the Sinclair Oil Company stopped by to visit and check on the station as they did from time to time. This gentleman was new to the route, so he was a little surprised to find the station unmanned in the middle of the day. He then saw the "Gone to Lunch" sign in the window, and decided to stick around and wait for Bob to get back. Well, he got tired of just sitting around and he noticed the dirt, or so he thought all over the side of one of the gas pumps. He decided to make himself useful, and got a wet rag and cleaned that gas pump to a sparkly shine, not knowing that he had just erased about a week's worth of lunchtime sales. When Bob got back, he was a little upset, to say the least. Knowing Bob now, 40 years or so after the incident and maybe a little mellower, I wouldn't have wanted to hear what he had to say that day.

I'm happy to say that as far as anyone can figure, he was paid for all the gasoline that was sold. When people came in, they knew what they had taken, and paid their bill, even though Bob had no way of knowing who bought gas, or how much they bought



make my way to the front of the line, but it was worth it.





Continued from page 15... **ALBUQUERQUE KIMO** theatre and has no underneath supports, was designed to give and sway to a capacity crowd — and it can drop four to eight inches in the process. For all its ornate detail, the theatre's construction was completed in less than one year.

In advance of opening night festivities, the New Mexico State Tribune reported that performers included "numerous prominent tribesmen of the Southwest who will perform for the audience mystic rites never before seen on a stage." And on that grand opening night, an overflow crowd watched dances by Native Americans from nearby pueblos. The Isleta Pueblo Governor Pablo Abeita won a \$50 prize, a considerable sum at the time, for naming the theatre KiMo, a combination of two words literally meaning "mountain lion", but more literally translated to mean "king of its kind!"

Over the years, hundreds of performers and actors have graced the KiMo stage and screen, some gaining superstar celebrity status, like Vivian Vance (Ethel Mertz from I Love Lucy!), exotic dancer Sally Rand, Gloria Swanson, cowboy Tom Mix, and Ginger Rogers, who did everything Fred Astaire did but backwards and in heels!, to name a few.

The KiMo fell into disrepair, when the great exodus from the American downtown was experienced in Albuquerque. Fortunately in 1977, the City of Albuquerque purchased the theatre, and saved it from further deterioration, and placed it on the National Register of historic Places. The latest renovation came in 1998 and cost approximately \$1.6 million dollars. Among the improvements came new seating, carpeting, adherence to tighter ADA standards, mural restorations, extensive cleaning, and a complete reconstruction of the ornate proscenium arch f hich was destroyed by a fire in 1963.

The theatre reopened in September 2000 and remains unique in the entire world a sparkling jewel on the enchanted cityscape. It is still used for its original purpose live stage performances and movies. Rumored to be haunted, it's the spirit of the lively arts that reside within its historic walls.

2002 marks the 75th anniversary of the KiMo Together with its close neighbor Route 66; they share the spotlight on Central Avenue in the heart of downtown Albuquerque. To find out more about the KiMo, you can call the theatre office at (505) 848-1370 or visit their website at www.cabq.gov/kimo.

SPEAKING IN PLATES

















Beginning in April with more preservation work, in Odell at the Standard Station, and also at the streetcar diner behind the Riviera Restaurant. May brought us the Hampton Inn's with their "Explore the Highway" program and signage kickoff at Lou Mitchell's Restaurant in downtown Chicago, where the first of 66 Roadside Attraction signs donated by Hampton Inn's was placed. 





This is a group of professional sign painters who enjoy their work so much that they schedule get togethers to paint old advertising signs, murals. Etc. for places interested enough to provide them with their meals and the paint that is used. They do not charge for their work and they pay their own lodging and travel expense. There were about 30 painters registered from Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas, Kentucky, Alabama and Arkansas. They were in town through July 14th. Friday August 2, a group of people driving cars from the 20's and 30's came to town. They were only




They have donated Historic Route 66 signs to all eight states. Illinois' received 14 of the Historic Route 66.

Illinois drivers are closer than ever to being able to choose a permanent Route 66 license plate for their automobiles.

The bill authorizing a commemorative specialty 66 license plate was signed into law by Governor George Ryan this past summer and is now in the hands of Secretary of State Jesse White.

The first question everyone asks is, "What will it look like?" The answer is we don't know yet. According to state officials, design and production of the plate will not proceed until a minimum of 850 requests have been recorded. Once the demand has been demonstrated, the Secretary of State's design team will go to work.

Petitions have been circulating throughout the past several months, including one that was signed by many Illinois Association members during the 2002 Motor Tour. Signatures have been collected at various sites and events throughout the state. Thanks primarily to the efforts of Rich Henry, about 525 requests have been filed to date. Although there is no deadline to meet, the goal of the Illinois Route 66 Heritage Project is to have the plates available by next year's travel season.

The specialty plates will cost \$40 at registration, in addition to the regular \$78 fee currently charged by the Secretary of State. At renewal, the additional fee drops to \$27. Each time a Route 66 plate is purchased or renewed; \$25 will be deposited in the Route 66

Heritage Project fund, which has been designated for the education, preservation and promotion of Route 66 in Illinois.

YOU can help and here's how. Tell everyone you know about the plate! Collect the name, address, phone number of anyone interested and be sure to request the vanity and personalized plate option, otherwise, the plates will be printed with sequential numbers starting at 101.

Any names you collect can be mailed, faxed, called or emailed to the Illinois Route 66 Heritage Project. Please contact us with any questions you may have about this worthwhile project and thank you for your support!




Volunteers make a difference all along Route 66

TALES FROM THE ROAD

These are warm memories of Old Route 66 by a very young at heart 86 year old Louise Libersher. This lady is a true treasure. To Louise, these were good days with hard times. As she grew up, she watched a town grow and a road called Route 66 grow and come to life. She doesn't want to see it die.

With the recent grand opening of the Joliet Historical Museum, which features an excellent Route 66 display, we felt these stories from the mother of our own Lenore Weiss would be very appropriate.

As a youngster growing up in Joliet near Route 66, I used to be amazed at how the garbage pickup was handled. Quite differently than today. Garbage was picked up in your alley. The garbage was "raw". Plastic bags did not exist in those days. The workers would follow a horse drawn two-wheeled cart and dump the garbage into it. They would take the filled cart to McDonough and Chicago Street where there was a ramp with trap doors. Under the ramp there was a waiting truck, waiting to take it to the disposal dump. To children, this was quite an adventure and we

couldn't wait to go home and tell our parents. Of course, we were always warned of the consequences of falling into the TRAP DOOR.

One of my fondest and most fun memories is about "Ducker's Corner". This was located at 217-223 N. Chicago St. (Route 66). This was the corner that the song "Standing on the corner watching all the girls go by", by the Four Lads could have been written about. This was where the boys would gather to "check out" the girls. We were only 14 or 15 years old so we would do our own "checking out" too. What a good time we had on Ducker's Corner. It was named that because the department store owned by George Ducker took up such a big piece of property, and was a very big part of Joliet. Mr. Ducker had a unique way of handling your purchase which was quite special at the time. Each clerk had their own area along with a wire conveyor system that would convey the money and sales slip in a little box up to the main office on the second floor. Then she would wait for the box to be returned along with the customer's change and sales slip, then

By Ted & Marilyn Giovanazzi the customer would receive the merchandise and the sale would be completed. It was almost as much fun to watch as watching the boys. NOT OUITE!

At 301 N. Chicago St (Route 66) and 329 E. Jefferson St in Joliet there was an ice cream parlor known as Blacey's. They served malts, shakes, and sundaes and had showcases full of tempting chocolates. After catechism classes at St. Anthony's Church we would walk there just to look and imagine how delicious it all was. It was depression time when I was growing up and times were hard. We could only look, but that in itself was fun. In season, the shop also displayed fresh produce outside. Sometimes, that was more tempting than the chocolates. There was also a Kresge's 25 cent and \$1.00 store located at 201 N. Chicago. After visiting Blacev's we would visit Kresge's. I'm sure everyone remembers some fun days at a Kresge's store. I sure do!

One block east of Chicago Street still stands Joliet's Union Station.

Special Event License Plate Update






What a great day! Over 100 cars fanned out while discovering Route 66 in Illinois.

"NOT DEAD"

I cannot take credit for all the wonderful stages of restoration that have taken place. This honor goes to volunteer, Joe Srsnick. Joe is an amateur archeologist with a great vision and dedication.

One of Joe's projects is to plot out the one acre area into a grid. Then using a prod pole, he patiently inch by inch sticks the rod into the ground hoping to locate ancient head stones lying below the ground surface. To date, all the marker stones discovered are from 1836 to 1847.

Of special interest to you and me is one particular marker. We presume it to be from the same time era, making this headstone over 150 years old. This stone is like no other. It clearly shows a shield, identical to the style used for the original Route 66 signs with the distinctive cut off points on top of each upper side. There once was wording around this very old shield, but time has obliterated it. That is except for two words.

"NOT DEAD"

This head stone was installed approximately 90 years before there was a Route 66, and before there were even road signs. Maybe it's all in my mind, but I find this to be a little bit eerie. *PLEASANT DREAMS!*

It has been remodeled and is truly a beautiful terminal. The automobile reduced the use of the station, but it was once a very busy place. I remember new lift bridges being built to handle increasing traffic between the east and west sides of town. As children, we would walk down to watch the construction and be amazed at the large equipment being used. Before the lift bridges, in the early twenties, there was a towing path between the river and canal. Mules would draw the barges on the tow path, down the canal to the river. When I grew up, married and bought my own home around 1940 I didn't want to leave Joliet and all its good memories. We stayed in the community and raised our family there. We took in boarders, because there were so many men looking for rooms. If you had a room for rent, men would line up outside your house. Between Route 66 being expanded toward the Joliet Arsenal and the arsenal working all shifts, men were looking for employment and a place to live in droves. Route 66 was good to Joliet and Joliet still loves Route 66.
